BOARD/SUPERINTENDENT COMMUNICATIONS

Board Members had the opportunity for Board/Superintendent communications. A summary is as follows:

Member Cazares commented there are district baseball fields that could use some help. Commented baseball fields do not get the same level of investment as other sports, so it falls on parents to fund raise, and coaches to come in on the weekends to prepare the fields. Commented there may be a need for a special analysis for sports that require more intervention.

Member Cazares highlighted National Nutrition month and the Fresno Unified School District Nutrition Services.

Member Cazares heartfully thanked those that participated in the superintendent search listening sessions and surveys, as the input received is valuable and will help guide the Board when selecting a new superintendent.

Member Cazares shared she had the honor to read to students in grades first, third and fourth at Eaton and Robinson as part of Read Across American and will be at McCardle, Viking, and Vinland next week. Member Cazares shared it invigorates the soul to read to students.

Member Cazares reminded everyone to remember older students during the reading initiative and asked for a strategic plan of services for older students.

Member Islas provided a shout out to Patino for being listed as a California Distinguished School, and Duncan for their fantastic work. Member Islas shared that Board members are privileged in their role by being able to participate in Read Across American and it is warming to read to students in the classrooms.

Member Islas shared a shout out for teacher Shannon Ito at Norseman who is part of the American Sign Language program. Member Islas joined Shannon and visited classrooms. Member Islas made a request for a need analysis for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing program. Member Islas shared that one challenge within the program is the need for substitutes that can sign. Member Islas would like the district to explore how the district is incentivizing opportunities for community members to enter paraprofessional pathways to help fill specific needs.

Member Islas would like the district to find a way for a speech language pathologist at Norseman to attend a conference. The speech language pathologist also signs, and Member Islas commented this is rare to find.

Member Islas commented that students deserve better to ensure their safety on the way to school, and requested the district explore other models of how to staff crossing guards at schools. Member Islas requested the district revisit the idea of providing noon-time assistants with an additional thirty minutes and a cost analysis.

Member Islas thanked Paul and the team for bringing the new cafeteria at Ericson Elementary School closer to completion.

Student Member Pitcher provided a shout out to Edison High School and Computech Middle School for participating and placing at the Fresno County Science Olympiad. Computech placed first and Edison placed second and qualified for State.

Student Member Pitcher recognized National School Breakfast Week and commented he loves blueberry parfaits.

Clerk Davis referenced comments made before closed session and requested the district research reasons hindering the Forensic Team from fund raising. Clerk Davis asked if there is an opportunity for district scholarships when teams representing the district move to state and national competitions.

Clerk Davis shared she participated in Read Across America and read to students at Ayer, Greenberg, and Storey. Clerk Davis thanked Parent University for hosting the, Every Child is a Reader Celebration at No Surrender.

Clerk Davis thanked the community for providing feedback on what they would like to see in the next superintendent.

ADOPTED as recommended, the Findings of Fact and Recommendations of District Administrative Panels resulting from hearings on expulsion and readmittance cases conducted during the period since the regular Board meeting on February 21, 2024.

A-3, APPROVE Meeting Minutes

APPROVED as recommended, the draft minutes for the February 21, 2024, Board of Education regular meeting.

A-4, ADOPT Resolution in Support of the CalKIDS Program

ADOPTED as recommended, Resolution 24-41 in the Matter of Commitment and Support of the CalKIDS Program.

For the record, Board Members had comments/questions pertaining to agenda item A-4. A summary is as follows:

Member Levine advocated for the CalKIDS program and shared highlights of the program such as, beginning July 2021 all newborns automatically have money

deposited into an account for college; all students in grades first through twelve have \$500 waiting in a college savings account; and studies show students with money in an account for college are more likely to attend and graduate from college.

Member Levine shared students need to claim these accounts and requested the Superintendent bring a plan to the Board to strategically message the CalKIDS program. Member Levine commented that this compliments the Bulldog Bound program.

Member Jonasson Rosas thanked Member Levine and Itzi Robles for their comments. Member Jonasson Rosas shared personal challenges faced when trying to enroll in the CalKIDS program and looks forward to the opportunity of creating an easier process for Fresno Unified families.

Member Islas offered full support of the resolution and thanked Itzii Robles for attending and speaking at the meeting. Thanked Member Levine for being the Board's internal champion of the program. Member Islas commented from a personal perspective and shared that dollars in a savings account make a difference, no matter the amount as long as there is thought about sending students to college.

On a motion by Board Clerk Davis, seconded by Board Member Islas, the Board adopted Resolution No. 24-41 by a vote of 6-0-0-1 as follows: AYES: Board Members: Cazares, Islas, Jonasson Rosas, Levine, Clerk Davis, and Board President Wittrup. ABSENT: Board Member Thomas.

A-4a, ADOPT Resolution 24-42 for 2024-2025 Regarding the Elimination/Layoff and/or Reduction in Force for Permanent Classified Employees

ADOPTED as recommended, Resolution 24-37, and Exemption Request Form, State Allocation Board (SAB) 406 to request an exemption renewal from the definition of a "school building" for the Bethesda Apostolic Church buildings, located at 3723 E. Dakota Avenue in Fresno, for use as a Suspension Tutoring Center by the Office of African American Academic Acceleration.

A-6, APPROVE Agreement with the California Association of Directors of Activities

APPROVED as recommended, an Agreement with the California Association of Directors of Activities (CADA) Central for the purpose of attending the CADA/California Association of Student Leaders (CASL) annual conferences and conventions.

For the record, Board Members had comments/questions pertaining to agenda item A-6. A summary is as follows:

Member Jonasson Rosas first provided context for several items on the agenda and how they relate to the current budget situation, and being mindful that dollars can be used for multiple purposes, especially now the district is in contraction mode decisions need to be weighed more closely. In the past the district was blessed with one-time funds but now the discussion is about contraction.

Member Jonasson Rosas asked how the district benchmarks to show value for the investment.

Bryan Wells, Natasha Baker, Ed.D., and Superintendent Nelson, Ed.D. were available to provide clarity.

Superintendent Nelson, Ed.D., requested guidance from the Board pertaining to field trips, conferences, and items related to Goal 2 that may be difficult to quantify from a qualitative perspective. Asked if the Board is amenable to sharing their legislative intent as to what should be measured. This is an area where substantive conversations are needed.

Member Jonasson Rosas commented that relativity should be addressed as there are multiple student leadership opportunities which have not been evaluated as to which one is a better investment. Especially now with the budget situation Member Jonasson Rosas quantifies the cost as a position, a person within the district.

Member Jonasson Rosas has some pause not only with this item but with similar agreements. Member Jonasson Rosas is uncomfortable programming out further than July, until the May revise. Member Jonasson Rosas is not sure the district has adjusted thinking to the new budget reality and does not say this item is not worthy but asks if it is the best option now. Member Jonasson Rosas will vote No until sure an item is the number one option and other similar items are cut.

On a motion by Board Member Cazares, seconded by Board Clerk Davis, the Board approved agenda item A-6 by a vote of 5-1-0-1 as follows: AYES: Board Members: Cazares, Islas, Levine, Clerk Davis, and Board President Wittrup. NOES: Board Member Jonasson Rosas. ABSENT: Board Member Thomas.

A-7, APPROVE Agreement with UnaMesa Association dba InPlay

APPROVED as recommended, an agreement with UnaMesa Association dba InPlay, which has a Student Data Privacy Agreement with the Fresno Unified School District Information Technology Department valid until April 2026.

For the record, Board Members had comments/questions pertaining to agenda item A-7. A summary is as follows:

Member Jonasson Rosas commented on having the opportunity to speak on some of the challenges pertaining to this application, and asked if this agreement fixes those issues.

Maiyer Vang was available to provide clarity.

On a motion by Board Member Jonasson Rosas, seconded by Board Member Cazares, the Board approved agenda item A-7 by a vote of 6-0-0-1 as follows: AYES: Board Members: Cazares, Islas, Jonasson Rosas, Levine, Clerk Davis, and Board President Wittrup. ABSENT: Board Member Thomas.

A-8, APPROVE Addendum to the Agreement with Fairbank, Maslin, Maullin, Metz & Associates (FM3) to Conduct a Community Survey Regarding a Potential Bond Measure

APPROVED as recommended, an addendum to the agreement with Fairbank, Maslin, Maullin, Metz & Associates (FM3) to conduct interviews in three languages, including additional poling of 100 likely voters in Trustee Area 7 which resulted in a survey with 821 respondents in English, Spanish and Hmong. Staff is requesting \$54,000 to support the additional services conducted to gauge voter continued interest in a potential 2024 bond measure to continue school facility improvements post Fresno Teachers Association (FTA) Negotiations October 2023.

For the record, Board Members had comments/questions pertaining to agenda item A-8. A summary is as follows:

Member Jonasson Rosas requested clarity as to the expansion of polling in only one trustee area. Requested clarity as to why the item is coming forward for approval rather than ratification as the work has already been completed. Member Jonasson Rosas commented it seems unusual to do only for one trustee, and as a trustee Member Jonasson Rosas would have wanted additional information for Trustee Area 2.

Member Cazares requested clarity as to why a poll was taken in trustee area 7. Member Cazares agreed some trustee areas have more acting voters than others and also agreed the option of additional polling should have been messaged to all board members.

Member Levine recalled receiving information during an FM3 meeting regarding push back in the Bullard regions. Member Levine agreed the district has room for improvement when items are brought for approval after the fact.

B-18, PRESENT and DISCUSS the Initial Proposal for the 2024/25 Budget

For the record, the Board received zero (0) requests to address the Board on agenda item B-18.

For the record, Board members had comments and/or questions pertaining to agenda item B-18. A summary is as follows:

Member Levine requested clarity as to when the district will know what option the Legislative Analyst Office has chosen. Requested clarity as to whether Safety is the only department not seeing cuts. Requested clarity as to whether cuts will take place in Ethnic Studies.

Member Jonasson Rosas commented it seems the district will see savings in the 2023/24 budget, and if the district has already contemplated those savings. Requested clarity as to if the \$30 million gap is already decreased by those savings. Requested clarity as to whether there are anticipated cuts to alternative education. Commented on having discussed the importance of safe routes to school but when considering cuts to LVNs, literacy coaches, and trainings for substitutes the \$300,000 for safe routes to schools could be postponed making sure there is enough to invest in those areas being cut; formally believes in safe routes to schools but the \$300,000 is better spent in LVNs and other areas mentioned.

Member Jonasson Rosas requested more information be provided pertaining to the programmatic impacts to the A4 department, what programs will be cut, what decision-making was used, and how programs were prioritized.

Member Islas commented that Adult Education is a jewel within the district and would benefit from enhanced communication and marketing. Member Islas would like the district to find more robust ways of increasing student enrollment at the adult school. Member Islas does not see it addressed in the proposed budget plan and it has been an increasing concern for a while.

Member Islas commented on safety and safe routes to school and asked if the work could be imbedded within the role of the 41 FTEs. Member Islas commented that a full-time NTA is not needed at all campuses; that elementary campuses should be prioritized and need more robust crossing guards. Member Islas did not say middle and high school campuses would not benefit but middle and high

school students are more autonomous and visible than elementary students. Additionally, having more robust infrastructure would encourage more students to walk and would help in the long run of decreasing congestion around campuses.

Member Islas would like the district to look at other models of how to provide increased supervision during the drop-off and pick-up time at campuses as these are times when students are at more risk of injury. Member Islas commented that any dollar invested to support the safety of students is important and reminded fellow board members safety was an item families listed as important in LCAP discussions.

Member Cazares requested clarity on the information provided on the reduction in attendance graph in the presentation, asked if the decreased attendance is being seen at a specific grade or age and asked it there is a program on incentive in place to encourage students back to school.

Member Cazares requested clarity on information provided on slide eleven pertaining to the reduction in contracted nurses' services of \$2.6 million, and how the reduction will impact the health and safety of students.

Member Cazares referenced slide twelve of the presentation and addressed the \$75,000 listed for safe routes to schools education/implementation for 15 current pilot sites; commented on holding off adding additional sites until the district is sure work is being done well. Requested information as to how the \$75,000 will be used.

Member Cazares requested more information on the adult education program and commented it is not given enough attention and would prefer to have someone from the department provide the Board with a robust presentation; what does the program do, what is needed to promote the program and encourage attendance, what is needed to make the program a better school. The status quo is not the road to take.

Member Cazares referenced slide fifteen and the referenced reductions, and commented the Board has provided directions year after year that this work is a priority and reductions should not take place in a department serving a population already not receiving services, and the district is not any way near close to meeting the goals of advancing the level of education for African American students.

Member Cazares referenced slide sixteen and the referenced reductions to Alternative Education and requested information on how the reductions will not impact services to students at the Farber Campus.

Member Cazares requested additional information be provided pertaining to reductions on slide seventeen.

President Wittrup thanked staff for the presentation and time provided to Board members to debrief. Echoed comments of Member Jonasson Rosas and urged staff to evaluate contracts and spending carefully, as \$150,000 for a contract may not seem like a lot but it could be an employee's job position.

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Included in the Board binders is resolution 24-39, proclaiming April 2024 as Autism Acceptance Month. The Center for Disease Control reports that more children are being diagnosed on the autism spectrum resulting in rates as high as one in 36 children nationally.

The Center for Disease Control reports:

- Four in 100 boys are identified with autism
- One in 100 girls are identified with autism
- Average age of autism diagnosis is 5.0
- Boys are four times more likely to be diagnosed with autism than girls
- Most children were still being diagnosed after age four, though autism can be reliably diagnosed as early as age two
- Autism affects all ethnic and socioeconomic groups
- Minority groups tend to be diagnosed later and less often

While there is no cure for autism, early diagnosis and intervention programs lead to significantly improved outcomes for individuals with autism.

The Autism Society of America announced the suggestion to shift in terminology from "Autism Awareness" to "Autism Acceptance." Autism acceptance recognizes the inclusion of individuals with autism rather than being aware that someone has autism.

During the month of April, Fresno Unified School District urges all schools and individual citizens to participate in Autism Acceptance Month.

12. <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. Either District or Contractor may terminate this Agreement at any time for any reason upon thirty (30) days prior written notice. In the event of early termination, Contractor shall be paid for satisfactory work

performed to the date of termination. The District may then proceed with the work in any manner the District deems proper.

Notwithstanding the expiration or termination of this Agreement for any reason (a) any provision of this Agreement that imposes or contemplates continuing obligations on a Party shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement, including without limitation, the rights and duties under Paragraphs 12, 13, 15, and 17; and (b) all undisputed fees due and payable hereunder through the termination date in accordance with Paragraphs 4 and 5.

13. Confidential Information

- a. For the purposes of this Agreement "Confidential Information" includes any written or oral information or data, disclosed by either Party to the other, which may include, without limitation, information relating to technical, financial, personnel, personal employee information, the network, corporate, administration, plan design, benefits or contractual affairs of either Party or a third party that has been identified as confidential or that by the nature of the circumstances surrounding disclosure ought reasonably to be treated as confidential.
- b. Contractor hereby agrees that it shall not disclose Confidential Information, and any materials, discussions, or other communications concerning Confidential Information to any person or entity, except to its own employees, contractor personnel, and to its attorneys, accountants, consultants and other professional advisors having a "need to know," and who are themselves bound by similar nondisclosure restrictions (collectively, "Representatives"). If Contractor becomes aware of any disclosure or use not in compliance with this Agreement, Contractor shall notify the District in writing within three (3) business days. Contractor shall use at least the same degree of care in safeguarding Confidential Information as it uses in safeguarding its own confidential information. Representatives shall be bound to comply with all terms of this Paragraph
 - 13.B. Upon the request of the District, Contractor shall provide a written acknowledgment from each of its Representatives that said Representative is bound by the terms of this Paragraph 13.B.
- c. Contractor's obligation under this Agreement to not disclose Confidential Information shall not apply to information that: (a) becomes generally available to the public other than as the result of unauthorized disclosure by Contractor or a third party; (b) is independently developed by Contractor without the aid, application or use of Confidential Information; or (c) was received by Contractor on a non-confidential basis prior to receipt from the District or from a third-party lawfully possessing and lawfully entitled to disclose such information.
- d. Disclosure of Confidential Information shall not be precluded if such disclosure is: (a) required pursuant to a valid court order; or (b) in the opinion of legal counsel for Contractor, is otherwise required by law, provided that in either circumstance:
 - Contractor shall furnish the District with a copy of the demand, summons, subpoena or other legal process to compel such disclosure;
 - Contractor shall give the District reasonable prior notice of its intention to disclose Confidential Information in order to allow the District an opportunity to seek appropriate protection; and
 - iii. Contractor shall take all reasonable steps including, without limitation, the pursuit of a protective order, to restrict the disclosure of Confidential Information to the greatest extent possible.
- e. All Confidential Information provided by the District to Contractor is and shall forever remain the sole and exclusive property of the District. By granting access to Confidential Information, the District does not grant any express or implied right to Contractor to use, publish or disclose any Confidential Information. After its review of the Confidential Information Contractor will return to the District all Confidential Information disclosed to it (including copies or summaries of Confidential Information), or with the District's permission destroy the Confidential Information and certify in writing that it has been destroyed.
- 14. <u>Injunctive Relief</u>. Each Party acknowledges that a breach or threatened breach of this Agreement may cause immediate and irreparable harm to the District and that, to protect against such harm, the District may seek from a court of competent jurisdiction the issuance of a restraining order or injunction to prohibit any threatened disclosure

or misuse of the District's Confidential Information. Such an action for a restraining order or injunction is in addition to and does not limit all other remedies provided by law or in equity or by agreement between the Parties.

15. <u>Indemnification and Hold Harmless</u>. To the fullest extent allowed by law, the Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold District, its agents, employees, Board of Trustees, members of the Board of Trustees, officials, officers, volunteers, and representatives ("Indemnities") free and harmless from any and all claims, demands, negligence (including the active or passive negligence of Indemnities, regardless of whether sole or otherwise, as allowed by law), causes of action, costs, expenses, liabilities, losses, damages or injuries, fines, penalties in law or equity, regardless of whether the allegations are false, fraudulent, or groundless, to property or persons, including wrongful death, (collectively "Loss") to the extent arising out of or incident to: 1) the performance or breach of any of the terms and conditions of the contract (including but not limited to) the Contractor's use of the site; or 2) any acts, omissions, negligence, in connection with the performance of Services or otherwise arising from this Contract ("Indemnification"); or 3) the willful misconduct of the Contractor or their respective agents, subcontractors, employees, material or equipment suppliers, invitees, or licensees. The Contractor's Indemnification includes, but is not limited to, the payment of all damages and attorney's fees, fines, penalties and other related costs and expenses.

a The Contractor's defense obligations (with counsel approved by District), shall arise immediately upon tender of any of the Indemnities, and the defense shall be paid at Contractor's own cost, expense and risk, for any and all such aforesaid suits, actions or other legal proceedings of every kind that may be brought or instituted against any of the Indemnities, notwithstanding whether liability is, can be or has yet been established.

b. The Contractor shall pay and satisfy any judgment, award or decree that may be rendered against any of the Indemnities, in any such suit, action or other legal proceeding. The Contractor shall reimburse Indemnities, and each of them, for any and all legal expenses and costs incurred by each of them in connection therewith or in enforcing the indemnity herein provided.

c. Acceptance of insurance certificates and endorsements required under the contract does not relieve the Contractor from liability under this indemnification and hold harmless clause. The requirements of this Section (Indemnification and Hold Harmless) shall apply whether or not such insurance policies shall have been determined to be applicable to any of such damages or claims for damages.

16. Insurance. Without limiting "Contractor" indemnification, it is agreed that "Contractor" shall secure and maintain in force during the term of this Agreement a Commercial General Liability policy (Contractual liability included) utilizing an occurrence policy form, with limits of not less than two million (\$2,000,000) dollars per occurrence, four million (\$4,000,000) annual aggregate limit. Business automobile Liability Insurance shall be maintained for owned, scheduled, non-owned or hired automobiles with a combined single limit not less than two million (\$2,000,000) dollars per occurrence. In the event "Contractor" is working with students individually or providing professional services to students, "Contractor" shall maintain a policy providing coverage for sexual molestation and/or abuse claims. In the event that "Contractor's" Commercial General liability policy excludes coverage for sexual molestation and/or abuse claims shall be required to procure a separate or supplemental policy providing such coverage. The limits of coverage for the abuse and molestation policy shall be not less than \$2,000,000 per claim and \$4,000,000 aggregate. If any of the required policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis then the following shall apply; 1) The retroactive date must be shown, and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work; 2) Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract work; (3) If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a retroactive date prior to the contract effective date, the Contractor must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of work. Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by District. The District may require "Contractor" to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claims administration and defense expenses within the retention. The policy shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention be satisfied by either the named insured the District. may The District shall be named as an additional insured on the policies by separate endorsement. A Certificate of Insurance and endorsements shall be attached to this Agreement as proof of insurance. The "Contractor" policy shall provide that it is primary such that insurance maintained by the District, if any, shall be excess and not co-primary.

- 17. <u>Independent Contractor Status</u>. While engaged in carrying out the terms and conditions of the contract, the Contractor is an independent contractor, and not an officer, employee, agent, partner, or joint venture of the District.
- 18. Workers' Compensation Insurance. Contractor agrees to provide all necessary workers' compensation insurance for Contractor's employees, if any, at Contractor's own cost and expense.
- 19. Fingerprinting Requirements. Contractor hereby acknowledges that, if applicable, it is required to comply with the requirements of Education Code Section 45125.1 with respect to fingerprinting of employees who may have contact with the District's pupils. The Contractor shall also ensure that its consultants on the Project also comply with the requirements of Section 45125.1. If required by Education Code Section 45125.1, the Contractor and its consultants, prior to any of the Contractor 's employees, or those of any other consultants, coming into contact with the District's pupils submit through the DISTRICT fingerprints to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the monitoring and supervision of employee(s) and/or affiliated constituents. Contractor will not begin work on the Project site until obtaining a DOJ cleared status through the DISTRICT. Contractor further acknowledges that other fingerprinting requirements may apply, as set forth in Education Code Section 45125 et seq., and will comply with any such requirements, including having Consultant certifies Consultants certify that none of these employees and/or affiliated constituent(s) will have been convicted of a felony as defined in Education Code section 45122.1. "Fingerprinting Requirements," is expressly understood and agreed to by the parties hereto:

- 20. Taxes. Contractor agrees that Contractor has no entitlement to any future work from the District or to any employment or fringe benefits from the District. District will not withhold FICA (Social Security), state or federal unemployment insurance contributions, state or federal income tax or disability insurance. Contractor is independently responsible for the payment of all applicable taxes.
- 21. <u>Assignment</u>. The Contractor shall not assign or transfer by operation of law or otherwise any or all of its rights, burdens, duties or obligations without the prior written consent of the District.

- Severability. If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent
 jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision hereof.
- 24. Waiver and Amendments. This Agreement may be amended, modified, superseded, cancelled, renewed or extended, and the terms and conditions hereof may be waived, only by a written instrument signed by the parties or, in the case of a waiver, by the party waiving compliance. The waiver by any party hereto of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach.
- Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California and venue shall be in the appropriate Superior court in Fresno, California.
- 26. Attorney's Fees. The non-prevailing party in any dispute under this Agreement shall pay all costs and expenses, including expert witness fees and attorney's fees, incurred by the prevailing party in resolving such dispute.

27. Written Notice. Written notice shall be deemed to have been duly served if delivered in person to the individual or member of the company or to an officer of the corporation for whom it was intended, or if delivered to or sent by registered or certified mail to the last business address known to the person who gives the notice.

TITLE AND SUBJECT: Approve Agreement with Kaiser Permanente Workforce Health Program - Class Pass

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Included in the Board binders is an agreement with Kaiser Permanent Workforce Health Program to provide an employee wellness program called Class Pass. Class Pass is a fitness membership program offering fitness and exercise credits to participants, which can then be utilized at thousands of different studios and gyms across the United States and worldwide to book in-person fitness classes and gym time. Participants will also have access to an on-demand library of audio and video exercise workouts as part of their membership.

Price is dependent on the buy-up option and the number of participants. The employer cost is \$10 per participant per month. As part of Kaiser Permanente's mission to promote wellness in the community, Kaiser has agreed to credit the plan for the first year up to \$100,000 for these services for the calendar year of 2024. The program will be re-evaluated for the 2025 calendar year.

The Class Pass program aligns with the Joint Health Management Board's established goals and responsibilities for providing high-quality wellness care to active employees, retirees, and dependents.

Dear Steven Shubin:

This letter agreement ("Agreement") memorializes our previous discussions about the Kaiser Permanente workforce health programs services that Kaiser Foundation Health Plan, Inc., on behalf of the Northern California Region ("Kaiser Permanente" or "KP") is providing or arranging for Fresno Unified School District ("Group"). KP and Group are collectively the "Parties," and each is a "Party." The services provided or arranged for under this Agreement are described in Exhibits A (any combination of Exhibits A-1, A-3, A-6, etc.) and are referred to in this Agreement as the "Services." The compensation rates applicable to Services are also included in Exhibits A. Exhibit B summarizes the Services chosen by Group and associated compensation rates.

ELIGIBLE GROUP PARTICIPANTS

Services will be available to certain Group participants as determined by Group, and the specific Group participants eligible for each Service are described in the various Exhibits A attached to this Agreement. Group participants include the following categories of participants:

Category of Group Participant	Description
1. KP-Subscribers	Group employees who are members of a KP health plan offered by Group (referred to as "KP-Subscribers")
2. KP-Subscriber-Dependents	KP-Subscribers' dependents, including spouses and domestic partners aged 18 or older who are members of a KP health plan offered by Group (referred to as "KP-Subscriber-Dependents")
3. Non-Subscribers	Group employees who are <u>not</u> members of a KP health plan offered by Group (referred to as "Non-Subscribers")
4. Non-Subscriber-Dependents	Non-Subscribers' and KP-Subscribers' spouses and domestic partners aged 18 or older who are <u>not</u> members of a KP health plan offered by Group (referred to as " Non-Subscriber-Dependents ")

The eligibility for any particular category of Group participant to access Services may vary by Exhibit and potentially within an Exhibit, and each Exhibit will control as to the availability of a Service to a particular Group participant.

SERVICES UNDER AGREEMENT

The Services are not regulated health plan benefits covered by KP when offered in the manner described in this Agreement. Group retains all responsibility for its group health plans' compliance with applicable law (including, as applicable, the Employment Retirement Income Security Act and its implementing regulations), as well as for its employee wellness programs' compliance with applicable law. KP does not provide legal advice to Group regarding the Services, and Group acknowledges its responsibility to consult with its own professionals for any legal advice regarding the Services.

INFORMATION NEEDED FROM GROUP

Where KP requires information or materials (for example, information about Non-Subscribers or access to space for work-site clinics) to perform its obligations under this Agreement, Group agrees to provide such information and materials (the "Required Materials," as described in Exhibits A). KP will have the right (and, if necessary, Group will obtain any third party rights necessary for KP) to copy, modify, and otherwise use Required Materials and any other content, information, records, and

materials provided by or for Group to KP for the purpose of KP performing its obligations and exercising its rights under this Agreement. If KP does not receive the Required Materials in the specific manner and according to the terms set forth in this Agreement, KP will be under no obligation to provide the Services that require such Required Materials.

USE OF KP PROPRIETARY MATERIALS

With respect to Services provided by KP, Group acknowledges that, as between the Parties, KP will have all right, title and interest in and to: (a) all content, materials, reports, software and documentation, and any other works of authorship, analytical methodologies, data organization, processes, concepts, systems, know-how, ideas, inventions, and other technology, whether or not confidential, related to the Services, (b) all enhancements, modifications, improvements or derivatives to the foregoing (whether or not created by KP, alone or with others), and (c) all intellectual property rights related to the foregoing (collectively (a), (b) and (c) are referred to as the "KP Proprietary Materials"). Group will not acquire any proprietary rights or licenses in the KP Proprietary Materials.

KP grants to Group a non-exclusive, non-assignable, non-sublicensable, non-transferable right to use any KP Proprietary Materials delivered to it by KP solely in connection with this Agreement. Upon the expiration or termination of this Agreement for any reason, Group will have a non-exclusive, non-assignable, non-sublicensable, non-transferable right to continue to use the reports containing data as well as health education materials furnished by KP to Group under this Agreement. At all times, Group's use of the KP Proprietary Materials is subject to and conditioned on Group's compliance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

TERM AND TERMINATION

This term of this Agreement runs from May 1, 2024 ("**Effective Date**") through December 31, 2024. If Services are still in process at the time of expiration of the term, the Agreement will continue until the Services are fully performed. Either Party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause, upon 60 days written notice to the other Party. Expiration or termination of this Agreement shall not affect those rights, obligations, powers, remedies, and liabilities that arose prior to expiration or termination or are continuing in nature.

NOTICES

All notices, consents, requests, demands or other communications to or upon the respective Parties will be in writing and will be effective for all purposes upon receipt, including without limitation, in the case of (i) personal delivery, (ii) delivery by messenger, express or air courier or similar courier (with confirmed delivery), (iii) delivery by United States first class certified or registered mail, postage prepaid and (iv) transmittal by email (with confirmed receipt), addressed to the respective address provided on the signature page. Changes in address will be communicated pursuant to this paragraph.

COOPERATION

Each Party may use affiliates, consultants or other contractors (together, "**Delegates**") in connection with the performance of its obligations and the exercise of its rights under this Agreement, provided that such Delegate will be subject to those obligations applicable to the delegating Party that are relevant to activities performed by Delegate.

Each Party will perform its obligations under this Agreement in a manner in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations. Where Group provides data on its employees to KP or a Delegate as necessary for performance of Services (for example, data on Non-Subscribers), Group agrees to follow applicable privacy law, including execution of a Business Associate Agreement where required. Each Party will cooperate with and participate in any activities reasonably necessary to assist the other Party in meeting its legal and regulatory obligations with respect to the Services, including cooperation with any review or examination of the other Party by any governmental agency. Such cooperation and participation will include, without limitation, cooperation with reviews and audits of paper, electronic, or other files, except to the extent inconsistent with applicable law. In accordance with applicable law, KP may use aggregated data and information collected in providing the Services.

Each Party recognizes that the other Party and its affiliates own or have the license to use certain logos, trademarks, service marks and trade names that identify the other Party and its affiliates and contractors and its and their products and services ("Marks"). All goodwill resulting from use of a Party's and its affiliates' and contractors' Marks will inure solely to that Party, its affiliates or contractors, as applicable. Neither Party has acquired, and will not acquire, any right, title or interest in or to the other Party's or its affiliates' or contractors' Marks. Each Party and its affiliates will not register or attempt to register the Marks or any trademark or service mark confusingly similar to the Marks of the other Party, its affiliates or contractors, and will retain the exclusive right to apply for and obtain registrations for its Marks and those of its affiliates throughout the world.

INVOICES

For any amounts owed by Group to KP, KP will submit an invoice to Group describing the Services provided. Group will pay KP within 30 days after receipt of the invoice. Payments will be made in U.S. currency to the KP address provided by KP.

MISCELLANEOUS

This Agreement will be governed in accordance with the laws of the State of California without reference to conflict of laws principles. This Agreement may be executed in separate counterparts, none of which need contain the signatures of both Parties, and each of which, when so executed, shall be deemed an original and all together constitute and be one of the same instrument. The Parties agree that an electronic signature or a scanned or electronically reproduced copy or image of this Agreement bearing the signatures of the Parties will be deemed an original and will represent competent evidence of the execution, terms and existence of this Agreement notwithstanding the failure or inability to produce an original, executed counterpart of this Agreement, and without the requirement that the unavailability of such original executed counterpart of this Agreement first be proven. Any determination that any provision of this Agreement or any application thereof is invalid, illegal, or unenforceable shall not affect the validity, legality, and enforceability of such provision in any other instance, or the validity, legality or enforceability of any other provision of this Agreement. This Agreement contains the complete understanding among the Parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous oral or written representations, communications, proposals or agreements not expressly included. All Exhibits to this Agreement are incorporated into this Agreement by this reference. No changes, amendments, cancellation, or modification to this Agreement will be effective unless signed by duly authorized representatives of both Parties.

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Included in the Board binders is an agreement with Men of Color in Educational Leadership (MCEL) to provide support for affinity space development and individual mentoring and coaching of Fresno Unified leaders of color. The intent is to support our district's goal to increase recruitment and retention of staff reflecting the diversity of our community (Local Control and Accountability Plan, Goal 4). MCEL has been working with our Black/African American leaders for the past three years. The objective of this proposal is to extend the same support services through MCEL for our Latino and Asian leaders.

MCEL will offer strategic mentorship and coaching within Fresno Unified and facilitate individual and group discussion opportunities that will enable effective challenge navigation and promote positive change for leaders of color. Additionally, MCEL will serve as a resource and thought partner, engaging principal supervisors and Central Office leaders.

MCEL's mentoring services will be offered to Central Office leaders, Latinx and Asian site leaders, and one Black/African American female principal through one-on-one mentoring and coaching sessions, virtually and in person. They will also facilitate three affinity group sessions for 95 female and male Latinx site leaders.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY: Sufficient funds in the amount of \$96,250 are available in the Leadership Development Budget.

If Contractor becomes aware of any disclosure or use not in compliance with this Agreement, Contractor shall notify the District in writing within three (3) business days. Contractor shall use at least the same degree of care in safeguarding Confidential Information as it uses in safeguarding its own confidential information. Representatives shall be bound to comply with all terms of this Paragraph
 - 13.B. Upon the request of the District, Contractor shall provide a written acknowledgment from each of its Representatives that said Representative is bound by the terms of this Paragraph 13.B.
- c. Contractor's obligation under this Agreement to not disclose Confidential Information shall not apply to information that: (a) becomes generally available to the public other than as the result of unauthorized disclosure by Contractor or a third party; (b) is independently developed by Contractor without the aid, application or use of Confidential Information; or (c) was received by Contractor on a non-confidential basis prior to receipt from the District or from a third-party lawfully possessing and lawfully entitled to disclose such information.
- d. Disclosure of Confidential Information shall not be precluded if such disclosure is: (a) required pursuant to a valid court order; or (b) in the opinion of legal counsel for Contractor, is otherwise required by law, provided that in either circumstance:
 - Contractor shall furnish the District with a copy of the demand, summons, subpoena or other legal process to compel such disclosure;
 - Contractor shall give the District reasonable prior notice of its intention to disclose Confidential Information in order to allow the District an opportunity to seek appropriate protection; and
 - Contractor shall take all reasonable steps including, without limitation, the pursuit of a protective order, to restrict the disclosure of Confidential Information to the greatest extent possible.
- e. All Confidential Information provided by the District to Contractor is and shall forever remain the sole and exclusive property of the District. By granting access to Confidential Information, the District does not grant any express or implied right to Contractor to use, publish or disclose any Confidential Information, After its review of the Confidential Information Contractor will return to the District all Confidential Information disclosed to it (including copies or summaries of Confidential Information), or with the District's permission destroy the Confidential Information and certify in writing that it has been destroyed.
- 14. <u>Injunctive Relief.</u> Each Party acknowledges that a breach or threatened breach of this Agreement may cause immediate and irreparable harm to the District and that, to protect against such harm, the District may seek from a court of competent jurisdiction the issuance of a restraining order or injunction to prohibit any threatened disclosure

- or misuse of the District's Confidential Information. Such an action for a restraining order or injunction is in addition to and does not limit all other remedies provided by law or in equity or by agreement between the Parties.
- 15. <u>Indemnification and Hold Harmless</u>. To the fullest extent allowed by law, the Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold District, its agents, employees, Board of Trustees, members of the Board of Trustees, officials, officers, volunteers, and representatives ("Indemnities") free and harmless from any and all claims, demands, negligence (including the active or passive negligence of Indemnities, regardless of whether sole or otherwise, as allowed by law), causes of action, costs, expenses, liabilities, losses, damages or injuries, fines, penalties in law or equity, regardless of whether the allegations are false, fraudulent, or groundless, to property or persons, including wrongful death, (collectively "Loss") to the extent arising out of or incident to: 1) the performance or breach of any of the terms and conditions of the contract (including but not limited to) the Contractor's use of the site; or 2) any acts, omissions, negligence, in connection with the performance of Services or otherwise arising from this Contract ("Indemnification"); or 3) the willful misconduct of the Contractor or their respective agents, subcontractors, employees, material or equipment suppliers, invitees, or licensees. The Contractor's Indemnification includes, but is not limited to, the payment of all damages and attorney's fees, fines, penalties and other related costs and expenses.
 - a The Contractor's defense obligations (with counsel approved by District), shall arise immediately upon tender of any of the Indemnities, and the defense shall be paid at Contractor's own cost, expense and risk, for any and all such aforesaid suits, actions or other legal proceedings of every kind that may be brought or instituted against any of the Indemnities, notwithstanding whether liability is, can be or has yet been established.
 - b. The Contractor shall pay and satisfy any judgment, award or decree that may be rendered against any of the Indemnities, in any such suit, action or other legal proceeding. The Contractor shall reimburse Indemnities, and each of them, for any and all legal expenses and costs incurred by each of them in connection therewith or in enforcing the indemnity herein provided.
 - c. Acceptance of insurance certificates and endorsements required under the contract does not relieve the Contractor from liability under this indemnification and hold harmless clause. The requirements of this Section (Indemnification and Hold Harmless) shall apply whether or not such insurance policies shall have been determined to be applicable to any of such damages or claims for damages.
- 16. Insurance. Without limiting "Contractor" indemnification, it is agreed that "Contractor" shall secure and maintain in force during the term of this Agreement a Commercial General Liability policy (Contractual liability included) utilizing an occurrence policy form, with limits of not less than two million (\$2,000,000) dollars per occurrence, four million (\$4,000,000) annual aggregate limit. Business automobile Liability Insurance shall be maintained for owned, scheduled, non-owned or hired automobiles with a combined single limit not less than two million (\$2,000,000) dollars per occurrence. In the event "Contractor" is working with students individually or providing professional services to students, "Contractor" shall maintain a policy providing coverage for sexual molestation and/or abuse claims. In the event that "Contractor's" Commercial General liability policy excludes coverage for sexual molestation and/or abuse claims shall be required to procure a separate or supplemental policy providing such coverage. The limits of coverage for the abuse and molestation policy shall be not less than \$2,000,000 per claim and \$4,000,000 aggregate. If any of the required policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis then the following shall apply; 1) The retroactive date must be shown, and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work; 2) Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract work; (3) If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a retroactive date prior to the contract effective date, the Contractor must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of work. Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by District. The District may require "Contractor" to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claims administration and defense expenses within the retention. The policy shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured the District. The District shall be named as an additional insured on the policies by separate endorsement. A Certificate of Insurance and endorsements shall be attached to this Agreement as proof of insurance. The "Contractor" policy shall provide that it is primary such that insurance maintained by the District, if any, shall be excess and not co-primary.

- Independent Contractor Status. While engaged in carrying out the terms and conditions of the contract, the Contractor
 is an independent contractor, and not an officer, employee, agent, partner, or joint venture of the District.
- Workers' Compensation Insurance. Contractor agrees to provide all necessary workers' compensation insurance for Contractor's employees, if any, at Contractor's own cost and expense.
- 19. Fingerprinting Requirements. Contractor hereby acknowledges that, if applicable, it is required to comply with the requirements of Education Code Section 45125.1 with respect to fingerprinting of employees who may have contact with the District's pupils. The Contractor shall also ensure that its consultants on the Project also comply with the requirements of Section 45125.1. If required by Education Code Section 45125.1, the Contractor and its consultants, prior to any of the Contractor 's employees, or those of any other consultants, coming into contact with the District's pupils submit through the DISTRICT fingerprints to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the monitoring and supervision of employee(s) and/or affiliated constituents. Contractor will not begin work on the Project site until obtaining a DOJ cleared status through the DISTRICT. Contractor further acknowledges that other fingerprinting requirements may apply, as set forth in Education Code Section 45125 et seq., and will comply with any such requirements, including having Consultant certifies Consultants certify that none of these employees and/or affiliated constituent(s) will have been convicted of a felony as defined in Education Code section 45122.1."Fingerprinting Requirements," is expressly understood and agreed to by the parties hereto:

- 20. Taxes. Contractor agrees that Contractor has no entitlement to any future work from the District or to any employment or fringe benefits from the District. Payments to the contractor pursuant to this Agreement will be reported to Federal and State taxing authorities as required. District will not withhold any money from compensation payable to Contractor. District will not withhold FICA (Social Security), state or federal unemployment insurance contributions, state or federal income tax or disability insurance. Contractor is independently responsible for the payment of all applicable taxes.
- Assignment. The Contractor shall not assign or transfer by operation of law or otherwise any or all of its rights, burdens, duties or obligations without the prior written consent of the District.
- Binding Effect. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the contractor and the District
 and their respective successors and assigns.
- Severability. If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent
 jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision hereof.
- 24. Waiver and Amendments. This Agreement may be amended, modified, superseded, cancelled, renewed or extended, and the terms and conditions hereof may be waived, only by a written instrument signed by the parties or, in the case of a waiver, by the party waiving compliance. The waiver by any party hereto of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach.
- 25. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California and venue shall be in the appropriate Superior court in Fresno, California.
- 26. Attorney's Fees. The non-prevailing party in any dispute under this Agreement shall pay all costs and expenses, including expert witness fees and attorney's fees, incurred by the prevailing party in resolving such dispute.

27. Written Notice. Written notice shall be deemed to have been duly served if delivered in person to the individual or member of the company or to an officer of the corporation for whom it was intended, or if delivered to or sent by registered or certified mail to the last business address known to the person who gives the notice.

- 31. Execution of Other Documents. The parties to this Agreement shall cooperate fully in the execution of any and all other documents and in the completion of any additional actions that may be necessary or appropriate to give full force and effect to the terms and intent of this Agreement.
- 32. Execution in Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts such that the signatures may appear on separate signature pages. A copy, or an original, with all signatures appended together, shall be deemed a fully executed agreement.
- 33. <u>Board Approval</u>. For contracts in excess of \$15,000.00, the effectiveness of this Agreement is contingent upon the approval of the Fresno Unified School District Board of Education.

USE LICENSE AGREEMENT

THIS USE LICENSE AGREEMENT (together with the Exhibits attached hereto, the "Agreement") is dated as of August 28, 2023 by and between ASM GLOBAL, a Pennsylvania general partnership ("ASM GLOBAL"), and Fresno Unified School District. Whose current address is 2309 Tulare Street, Fresno, CA. 93721 (the "Licensee").

BACKGROUND

ASM GLOBAL is the manager of a facility commonly known as the Fresno Convention & Entertainment Center (the "Facility"), located at 848 M Street, Second Floor, Fresno, CA 93721, which is owned or leased by the City of Fresno (the "Owner"). Licensee desires to use all or a portion of the Facility, as set forth below, for the purposes stated herein. Accordingly, ASM GLOBAL desires to grant to Licensee, and Licensee hereby accepts from ASM GLOBAL, a license to use certain areas of the Facility in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and the mutual promises, covenants, and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto, intending to be legally bound, hereby agree as follows:

Use of the Facility.

- (a) ASM GLOBAL hereby grants Licensee, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter expressed, a license to use those areas of the Facility described on Exhibit A attached hereto (the "Authorized Areas"). This includes all improvements, furniture, fixtures, and easements, rights of ingress and egress, and appurtenances thereto, during the dates and times set forth on Exhibit A (each such date and time, an "Event"). It is expressly understood by the parties hereto that the Facility shall be vacated by Licensee and all persons participating in or attending an Event hereunder on or prior to the end-time of the last Event listed on Exhibit A hereto (the "Expiration Time"). Licensee shall arrange to have all Events and activities related thereto cease within a reasonable time prior to the Expiration Time to allow ample time for the Facility to be completely vacated on or prior to the Expiration Time.
- (b) In the event Licensee desires to use the Authorized Areas or any other portion of the Facility at any time other than during the dates and times delineated on Exhibit A, Licensee shall request from ASM GLOBAL prior written permission to use such areas of the Facility. In the event such permission is granted, Licensee shall pay as additional rent; an amount equal to the sum of ASM GLOBAL's actual costs for performing its obligations under this Agreement during the date(s) and time(s) requested. In addition, a rental fee in an amount determined by ASM GLOBAL to represent a fair value for use of such additional areas of the Facility during such date(s) and time(s).
- (c) Licensee acknowledges that, in connection with ASM GLOBAL's management and operation of the Facility, ASM GLOBAL utilizes the services of approved local vendors (the "Third-Party Contractors"). Licensee hereby agrees that ASM GLOBAL shall not be responsible in any way for the acts and/or omissions of any one or all of the Third-Party Contractors.
- (d) Licensee acknowledges that the Facility is one component of a complex (such other non-Facility areas are collectively referred to herein as the "Complex"). Licensee further acknowledges that ASM GLOBAL will use reasonable efforts to minimize for Licensee any inconvenience or disturbance which may result from the operation, construction, expansion, renovation, and/or other use of the Complex, to the extent that the foregoing activities are within ASM GLOBAL's reasonable control. Licensee hereby agrees to hold ASM GLOBAL, Owner, and their respective officers, directors, agents, and employees harmless from and against any and all claims (including, without limitation, claims for bodily injury, death or damage to property), demands, obligations, damages, actions, causes of action, suits, losses, judgments, fines, penalties, forfeitures, liabilities, costs and expenses (including, without limitation, attorneys' fees, disbursements and court costs, and any and all other professional, expert or consultants' fees and costs and ASM

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GLOBAL's and the Owner's general and administrative expenses) of every kind and nature whatsoever (collectively, the "Losses") arising out of any of the foregoing activities occurring at the Complex.

(e) Floor Plans, Descriptions, and Set-Up.

- (i) At least sixty (60) days prior to the first Event day, Licensee shall provide to ASM GLOBAL, for ASM GLOBAL's and/or the City of Fresno Fire Marshall's approval, five (5) copies of a full and complete floor plan for the Event. Based upon a review by ASM GLOBAL and/or such Fire Marshall of the foregoing plan, ASM GLOBAL may request Licensee, by written notice within ten (10) days after receiving the materials, to make such changes, deletions, and/or additions as ASM GLOBAL may, in its reasonable discretion, deem necessary or desirable. Failure by Licensee to make any such reasonable changes, deletions, or additions within seven (7) days after receipt of written notice thereof shall constitute a breach of this Agreement.
- (ii) In addition to the floor plan delivered under clause (i) above, at least sixty (60) days prior to the first Event, Licensee shall provide to ASM GLOBAL, for ASM GLOBAL's review (and/or the review of any consultant or representative engaged by ASM GLOBAL), five (5) copies of a full and complete description of all set-up (including, without limitation, any staging, lighting, video boards, and/or rigging from or to the physical structure of the Facility or any fixture thereto required for the Event), electrical, communications systems, and plumbing work anticipated to be needed for the Event.
- (iii) At least four (4) weeks prior to the first Event day, Licensee shall provide to ASM GLOBAL information relating to room or hall set-up(s), staging, event personnel requirements, and food and beverage requirements.
- (iv) Licensee shall be solely liable for all Losses arising from Licensee's failure to deliver to ASM GLOBAL the materials described in subparagraphs (i), (ii) and (iii) of this Section 1(e) within the specified periods, including, without limitation, overtime pay and short-notice delivery fees.

Purpose.

- (a) The Facility will be used solely for the purpose of the Fresno Unified Principal's Meeting. Licensee shall not use the Facility, or permit the Facility to be used by any of its officers, directors, agents, employees, licensees, or invitees, for any unlawful or immoral purpose or in any manner so as to injure persons or property in, on, or near the Facility.
- (b) Licensee shall be solely liable for any and all Losses occurring at the Facility (whether within or without an Authorized Area) caused to ASM GLOBAL, Owner and/or persons and/or property in, on, or near the Facility before, during, or after an Event, by (i) Licensee's failure to comply with any and all federal, state, foreign, local, and municipal regulations, ordinances, statutes, rules, laws, constitutional provisions, and common laws (collectively, the "Laws") applicable to Licensee's performance of this Agreement and/or activities at the Facility, (ii) any unlawful acts on the part of Licensee or its officers, directors, agents, employees, subcontractors, licensees, or invitees, (iii) the negligent acts, errors and/or omissions or the willful misconduct of Licensee or its officers, directors, agents, employees, subcontractors, licensees, or invitees, (iv) the material breach or default by Licensee or its officers, directors, agents, or employees of any provisions of this Agreement, including, without limitation, the provisions of Section 14(m) hereof (relating to intellectual property matters), Section 15 hereof (relating to the Civil Rights Act), and Section 16 hereof (relating to the Americans with Disabilities Act), and (v) any and all rigging from or to the physical structure of the Facility or any fixture thereto, set-up, alterations, and/or improvements at or to the Facility necessitated by and/or performed with respect to the Event.

- (c) Licensee shall conduct business in the Facility in a dignified and orderly manner with full regard for public safety and in conformity with all Rules and Regulations for facility users, including fire, safety and health rules, as may be imposed from time to time by Company and/or local authorities. Licensee shall provide to Company, for Licensor's review and approval (i) a full and complete description of all set-up (including, without limitation, any staging, lighting, video boards, and/or rigging from or to the physical structure of the Facility or any fixture thereto required for the Event), electrical, communications systems, and plumbing work anticipated to be needed for the Event, and (ii) a Licensee Operations Plan in substantially the same form supplied by Licensor. Licensee shall update the Plan from time-to-time as may be necessary or appropriate to address any changes in operating conditions. Licensor reserves the right in its sole discretion to accept the Plan, or request modifications to ensure compliance with event rules imposed by the Licensor and all other applicable laws, regulations, codes, ordinances, orders or similar requirements.
- (d) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, neither ASM GLOBAL, nor the City, shall be responsible in any way for the acts or omissions of any of Licensee's invitees, staff or volunteers (whether or not authorized by Licensee) working, or otherwise present, at the Facility. Licensee shall indemnify, defend, and/or hold ASM GLOBAL and the City harmless for the acts or omission of any invitees, staff, and/or volunteers according to the provisions contained in Section 11 herein below.

Condition of Facility.

- (a) Licensee acknowledges that Licensee has inspected the Facility and that Licensee is satisfied with and has accepted the Facility in its present condition.
- (b) ASM GLOBAL shall have the continuing obligation and responsibility to maintain and keep the Facility in good order and repair, normal wear and tear excepted; provided, however, that (i) the failure by ASM GLOBAL to accomplish the foregoing, said failure resulting from circumstances beyond the control of ASM GLOBAL, shall not be considered a breach of this Agreement by ASM GLOBAL, and (ii) any damages to the Facility and its appurtenances caused by Licensee or its officers, directors, agents, employees, subcontractors, licensees, or invitees shall be paid for by Licensee at the actual or estimated cost of repair, as elected by ASM GLOBAL.
- (c) Licensee shall not make any alterations or improvements to the Facility without the prior written consent of ASM GLOBAL. Any alterations or improvements of whatever nature made or placed by Licensee to or on the Facility, except movable trade fixtures, shall, at the option of ASM GLOBAL, (i) be removed by Licensee, at Licensee's expense, immediately upon the conclusion of the Event, or (ii) become the property of the Owner. ASM GLOBAL may accept, at its election delivery of property addressed to Licensee only as a service to Licensee, and Licensee will indemnify, defend, and hold harmless ASM GLOBAL for any loss or damage to such property in the receipt, handling, care, and custody of such property at any time. ASM GLOBAL assumes no responsibility whatsoever for any property placed in the Facility. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary set forth herein, Licensee shall be solely responsible and liable for any Losses arising out of any rigging from or to the physical structure of the Facility or any fixture thereto, set-up, alterations, and/or improvements at or to the Facility necessitated by and/or performed with respect to the Event.
- 4. <u>Term of License.</u> The license granted in Section 1 above will be effective as of the date and time set forth on Exhibit A and will continue in effect, unless earlier terminated as set forth in Section 12, until the date and time set forth on Exhibit A.



- 5. <u>License Fee, Broadcast Fee, Additional Equipment and Service Expenses.</u> In consideration of the grant of the license in Section 1 above, Licensee shall pay to ASM GLOBAL a license fee, broadcast fee, and shall reimburse ASM GLOBAL for certain service expenditures, all as calculated in accordance with the provisions set forth below and in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, consistently applied:
 - (a) License Fee. Licensee shall pay the rental fee ("License Fee") as outlined on Exhibit B.
- (b) Broadcast Fee. ASM GLOBAL shall retain all television, film, radio and/or recording rights to any Events, which take place in or at the Facility. Licensee may purchase such rights from ASM GLOBAL for a broadcast fee (the "Broadcast Fee") equal to the greater of (i) TWO THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED, (\$2,500), or (ii) in the event that Licensee desires to sell such rights to a third party after purchasing them from ASM GLOBAL pursuant to this clause (c), FIFTEEN PERCENT (15%) of all amounts received by Licensee from such third party under the applicable written contract between Licensee and such third party. Said contract shall be delivered to ASM GLOBAL not less than 24 hours prior to the commencement of any such television, broadcast, film or recording activity of any Event in or at the Facility, and shall be accompanied by a written and signed statement by Licensee that no other agreement, express or implied, written or oral, has, to its knowledge, been reached or is in the process of being reached wherein Licensee shall receive any additional monies for such rights.

(c) Additional Equipment and Service Expenses.

- (i) ASM GLOBAL shall provide on an exclusive basis, as required for each Event, the following services to include but limited to (collectively, the "Services"), the expenditures which are paid by Licensee to ASM GLOBAL ("Additional Equipment and Service Expenses"): ushers, supervisors, and receptionists; medical services for Event attendees, which services shall include ambulances, doctors, nurses, operations, supervisors, and paramedics; security personnel; utilities, including electricity, gas, lighting, water, heating, ventilating, air conditioning, hot and cold water facilities, and waste removal services; electricians and mechanical plant staff; custodial services; scoreboard operations; audio services; and special facilities, equipment and materials, or extra services furnished by ASM GLOBAL at the request of Licensee or required by facility agreements.
- (ii) ASM GLOBAL shall determine the level of staffing for such Services at each Event after consultation with, and input from, Licensee. Licensee acknowledges and understands that many of the Services are contracted services, the costs of which are subject to change. Licensee shall reimburse ASM GLOBAL in connection with the Services as provided in Section 6 below.

6. Payment Terms.

- (a) <u>License Fee, and Broadcast Fee.</u> The License Fee, and Broadcast Fee set forth in Sections 5(a), (b), and (c) of this Agreement shall be paid by Licensee as provided in <u>Exhibit B</u> attached hereto.
- (b) Additional Equipment and Service Expenses After ASM GLOBAL's receipt of Licensee's floor plan and set-up description pursuant to Section 1(e) above, ASM GLOBAL shall deliver to Licensee an Event Resume, setting forth ASM GLOBAL's estimate of all expenses, which ASM GLOBAL will incur in connection with the Services. ASM GLOBAL shall deliver to Licensee an Event Settlement setting forth the expenses incurred for the services rendered by ASM GLOBAL either at the settlement or no later than 10 days after the conclusion of event. In the event the amount reflected in the Event Settlement exceeds the amount reflected in the Event Resume, Licensee shall promptly pay to ASM GLOBAL the amount of the excess. In the event the amount reflected in the Event Resume exceeds the amount reflected in the Event Settlement, ASM GLOBAL will refund Licensee with the Event Settlement. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary set forth in this Agreement, ASM GLOBAL's failure to deliver either the Event Resume or the Event Settlement shall not excuse Licensee's obligation to pay any amounts due hereunder.

- (c) <u>Late Charges.</u> If Licensee fails to pay any amounts when due under this Agreement, Licensee shall pay to ASM GLOBAL a late charge of 1.5% per month on the unpaid balance.
- (d) <u>Security for Payment/Advance Deposit</u>. Licensee shall pay the rental fee ("License Fee") as outlined on <u>Exhibit B</u>. See <u>Exhibit B</u> for complete payment schedule.
- 7. Revenues and Costs. ASM GLOBAL shall retain one hundred percent (100%) of all revenues generated in connection with parking lot fees and the sale of food and beverages at the Facility. In addition to payment of the Additional Equipment and Service Expenses above, Licensee shall bear all expenses incurred by Licensee in connection with the holding of an Event at the Facility, including, but not limited to, all costs arising from the use of patented, trademarked or copyrighted materials, equipment, devices, processes or dramatic rights used on or incorporated in the conduct of an Event.

8. Records, Reports.

- (a) Records. Licensee shall maintain accurate books and records with respect to its activities at the Facility, including, but not limited to, the costs and revenues of each Event. Licensee shall keep and preserve such books and records at all times during the term of this Agreement and for at least three (3) years following the expiration or termination hereof.
- (b) Reports. Licensee shall deliver to ASM GLOBAL no later than TEN DAYS (10) days after the date of a revenue-generating Event for the account of ASM GLOBAL a detailed written notice of the amounts claimed to be due to ASM GLOBAL pursuant to Sections 5(a), 5(b), 5(c), and 6(a) of this Agreement (each a "Statement"). Each Statement shall detail (i) with respect amounts collected by Licensee, with all deductions (sales tax, etc.) there from, (ii) with respect to broadcast revenues, a detail of all broadcast revenues collected by Licensee, with all deductions (sales tax, etc.) there from. Statements shall be deemed incontestable unless objected to by ASM GLOBAL, in writing, specifying the nature of and reasons for such objection, within twelve (12) months after receipt by ASM GLOBAL.
- 9. Taxes. ASM GLOBAL shall not be liable for the payment of taxes, late charges, or penalties of any nature relating to any Event or any revenue received by, or payments made to, Licensee in respect of any Event, except as otherwise provided by law. Licensee shall pay and discharge as they become due, promptly and before delinquency, all taxes, assessments, rates, damages, license fees, municipal liens, levies, excises, or imposts, whether general or special, or ordinary or extraordinary, of every name, nature, and kind whatsoever, including all governmental charges of whatsoever name, nature, or kind, which may be levied, assessed, charged, or imposed, or which may become a lien or charge against this Agreement or any other improvements now or hereafter owned by Licensee.

Insurance.

- (a) Licensee shall, at its own expense, secure and deliver to ASM GLOBAL not less than thirty (30) days prior to the first Event set forth on Exhibit A and shall keep in force at all times during the term of this Agreement:
- (i) a comprehensive general liability insurance policy in form acceptable to ASM GLOBAL, including public liability and property damage, covering its activities hereunder, in an amount not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for property damage, including blanket contractual liability, independent contractors, and products and completed operations. The foregoing general liability insurance policy shall not contain exclusions from coverage relating to the following participants, legal liability activities or



issues related to the Event hereunder: sporting events, high-risk events (including, without limitation, rap concerts), performers, volunteers, animals, off-premise activities, and fireworks or other pyrotechnical devices.

- (ii) comprehensive automotive bodily injury and property damage insurance in form acceptable to ASM GLOBAL for business use covering all vehicles operated by Licensee, its officers, directors, agents and employees in connection with its activities hereunder, whether owned by Licensee, ASM GLOBAL, or otherwise, with a combined single limit of not less than Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) (including an extension of hired and non-owned coverage).
- (iii) Applicable workers compensation insurance for Licensee's employees, as required by applicable law.
 - (b) The following shall apply to the insurance policies described in clauses (i) and (ii) above:
- (i) ASM GLOBAL and Owner shall be named as additional insured's there under. Not less than thirty (30) days prior to the first Event set forth on Exhibit A; Licensee shall deliver to ASM GLOBAL certificates of insurance evidencing the existence thereof, all in such form as ASM GLOBAL may reasonably require. Each such policy or certificate shall contain a valid provision or endorsement stating, "This policy will not be canceled or materially changed or altered without first giving thirty (30) days' written notice thereof to each of (1) ASM GLOBAL, Risk Management Director, 300 Four Falls Corporate Center, 300 Conshohocken State Road, West Conshohocken, PA, 19428, (2) ASM GLOBAL, General Manager, 848 M Street, Second Floor, Fresno, CA 93721, and (3) the City of Fresno, Attention: City Manager, 2600 Fresno Street, Room 2064, Fresno, CA 93721." If any of the insurance policies covered by the foregoing certificates of insurance will expire prior to or during the time of an Event, Licensee shall deliver to ASM GLOBAL at least thirty (30) days prior to such expiration a certificate of insurance evidencing the renewal of such policy or policies.
- (ii) And "The City of Fresno, ASM GLOBAL, their officers, agents, volunteers and employees are included as additional insured. It is further agreed that this insurance is primary to all other similar coverage carried by the City of Fresno, and/or ASM GLOBAL, and the Licensee and their insurance shall have no right or recovery or subrogation against the operator."
 - (iii) The coverage provided under such policies shall be occurrence-based, not claims made.
 - (iv) The coverage limits contained on such policies shall be on a per-occurrence basis only.
- (v) Licensee hereby acknowledges that the coverage limits contained in any policy, whether such limits are per occurrence or in the aggregate, shall in no way limit the liabilities or obligations of Licensee under this Agreement, including, without limitation, Licensee's indemnification obligations under Section 11 below.
- (vi) All policies must be issued by companies authorized to do business in the State of California and assigned a rating of B+VI or better, per Best's Key Rating Guide, latest edition.
- (c) The terms of all insurance policies referred to in this Section 10 shall preclude subrogation claims against ASM GLOBAL and Owner and their respective officers, directors, employees, and agents.
- (d) The failure of the Licensee to provide insurance in accordance with this Section 10 shall be a breach of this Agreement and shall, notwithstanding any cure period set forth in Section 12 below, preclude the Event from taking place

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11. Indemnification.

- (a) Licensee shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless City of Fresno, ASM Global Parent, Inc., and their respective officers, directors, agents, employees and volunteers (the "Indemnitees") from and against any and all losses, liabilities, claims, damages and expenses (including reasonable costs of investigation and attorneys' fees) (collectively, the "Losses") occurring at the Facility (whether within or without an Authorized Area) caused to Licensor, Owner and/or persons and/or property in, on, or near the Facility before, during, or after an Event, by (i) Licensee's failure to comply with any and all federal, state, foreign, local, and municipal regulations, ordinances, statutes, rules, laws, constitutional provisions, and common laws (collectively, the "Laws") applicable to Licensee's performance of this Agreement and/or activities at the Facility, including without limitation, health and safety laws, the Civil Rights Act, the American with Disabilities Act and intellectual property laws, (ii) any unlawful acts on the part of Licensee or its officers, directors, agents, employees, subcontractors, licensees, or invitees, (iii) the negligent acts, errors and/or omissions or the willful misconduct of Licensee or its officers, directors, agents, employees of any provisions of this Agreement, (v) any and all rigging from or to the physical structure of the Facility or any fixture thereto, set-up, alterations, and/or improvements at or to the Facility necessitated by and/or performed with respect to the Event.
- (b) The provisions set forth in subparagraph (a) above shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

Default, Termination and Other Remedies.

- Licensee fails (A) to pay any amount due hereunder (including, without limitation, the Licensee Fee or the Additional Equipment and Service Expenses) when the same are required to be paid hereunder or (B) to provide the security required under Section 6(a) hereof by the date when due, (ii) Licensee or any of its officers, directors, employees or agents fails to perform or fulfill any other term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement and Licensee fails to commence a cure thereof within five (5) business days after Licensee has been served with written notice of such default, or (iii) Licensee makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors. ASM GLOBAL shall be in default under this Agreement if ASM GLOBAL fails to perform or fulfill any term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement and ASM GLOBAL fails to commence a cure thereof within five (5) business days after ASM GLOBAL has been served with written notice of such default. Nothing herein shall be construed as excusing either party from diligently commencing and pursuing a cure within a lesser time if reasonably possible. Notwithstanding clause (ii) above, if the breach by Licensee or any of its officers, directors, employees, or agents of such other term, covenant, or condition is such that it threatens the health, welfare, or safety of any person or property, then ASM GLOBAL may, in its discretion, require that such breach be cured in less than five (5) business days or immediately.
- (b) Termination by Reason of Default. Upon a default pursuant to Section 12(a) hereof, the non-breaching party may, at its option, upon written notice or demand upon the other party, cancel and terminate the license granted in Section 1 hereof and the obligations of the parties with respect thereto. In addition to the foregoing, if Licensee fails to comply with any of the provisions of this Agreement, ASM GLOBAL may, in its sole discretion, delay and/or withhold payment and/or settlement of all accounts and funds related to monies collected or received by ASM GLOBAL for the benefit of Licensee hereunder until the completion of an investigation relating to such violation.



- (c) Termination by Reason of Labor Dispute. In addition to the remedies provided elsewhere in this Agreement, ASM GLOBAL shall have the right to terminate this Agreement in the event that a dispute occurs between Licensee and its employees or between Licensee and any union or group of employees by reason of the union affiliation or lack of union affiliation of persons employed by Licensee or any one with whom Licensee contracts.
- (d) <u>Injunctive Relief.</u> In addition to any other remedy available at law, equity, or otherwise, ASM GLOBAL shall have the right to seek to enjoin any breach or threatened breach and/or obtain specific performance of this Agreement by Licensee upon meeting its burden of proof of such breach or threatened breach as required by applicable statute or rule of law.
- (e) <u>Unique Qualities.</u> The parties agree and acknowledge that the Licensee is a unique entity and, therefore, the rights and benefits that will accrue to ASM GLOBAL by reason of this Agreement are unique and that ASM GLOBAL may not be adequately compensated in money damages for Licensee's failure to comply with the material obligations of Licensee under this Agreement and that therefore ASM GLOBAL, at its option, shall have the right to pursue any remedy available at law, equity, or otherwise, including the recovery of money damages and/or the right to seek equitable relief (whether it be injunctive relief, specific performance or otherwise) in the event that Licensee violates its obligation to hold an Event at the Facility, or to provide evidence of fulfillment of its obligations under Section 14(m) of this Agreement.
- 13. <u>Representations and Warranties.</u> Each party hereby represents and warrants to the other party, and agrees as follows:
- (a) It has the full power and authority to enter into this Agreement and perform each of its obligations hereunder.
- (b) It is legally authorized and has obtained all necessary regulatory approvals for the execution, delivery, and performance of this Agreement; and
- (c) No litigation or pending or threatened claims of litigation exist which do or might adversely affect its ability to fully perform its obligations hereunder or the rights granted by it to the other party under this Agreement.
 - Covenants. Licensee hereby covenants as follows:
 - (a) Licensee shall not occupy or use the Facility except as provided in this Agreement.
- (b) Licensee shall comply with all legal requirements, which arise in respect of the Facility and the use and occupation thereof.
- (c) Licensee shall not cause or permit any Hazardous Material to be used, stored, or generated on, or transported to and from the Facility. "Hazardous Material" shall mean, without limitation, those substances included within the definitions of "hazardous substances", "hazardous materials", "toxic substances", or "solid waste" in any applicable state or federal environmental law.
- (d) Licensee shall not advertise, paint, post, or exhibit, nor allow to be advertised, painted, posted, or exhibited, signs, advertisements, show bills, lithographs, posters, or cards of any description inside or outside or on any part of the Facility except upon written permission of ASM GLOBAL.



- (e) Licensee shall not broadcast by television, radio or internet any Event scheduled to be presented in the Facility under the terms of this Agreement without the prior written approval of ASM GLOBAL. If approval is granted by ASM GLOBAL, then all monies received from such broadcast will be considered as broadcast revenues for determining the Broadcast Fee due to ASM GLOBAL.
- (f) Licensee shall not cause or permit beer, wine, or liquors of any kind to be sold, given away, or used upon the Facility.
 - (g) Licensee shall not operate any equipment or materials belonging to ASM GLOBAL.
- (h) No portion of any passageway or exit shall be blocked or obstructed in any manner whatsoever, and no exit door or any exit shall be locked, blocked, or bolted while the Facility is in use. Moreover, all designated exit ways shall be maintained in such manner as to be visible at all times.
- (j) If the Licensee Fee includes a percentage of revenue generated from an Event, then no collections, whether for charity or otherwise, shall be made, attempted, or announced at the Facility, without first having made a written request and received the prior written consent of ASM GLOBAL. In such event, donations or collections are granted by ASM GLOBAL in lieu of an admission, then all such monies received from such collections or donations will be considered as revenues for determining the License Fee due to ASM GLOBAL.
- (k) Licensee shall abide by and conform to all rules and regulations adopted or prescribed by ASM GLOBAL in addition to all state and local laws, orders, or mandates including but not limited to OSHA and ADA.
- (m) Licensee shall not encumber, hypothecate, or otherwise use as security its interests in this Agreement for any purpose whatsoever without the express written consent of ASM GLOBAL.
- With respect to any Event at the Facility, Licensee shall comply fully with any and all local, state, and federal laws, regulations, rules, constitutional provisions, common laws, and rights of others applicable to the reproduction or performance of proprietary or copyrighted materials and works of third parties (the "Works"), and to the protection of the intellectual property rights associated with such Works. The fees payable by Licensee under this Agreement do not include royalty, copyright or other payments which may be payable on behalf of third party owners of such Works, and Licensee agrees hereby to make any and all such payments to third parties and/or clearinghouse agencies as may be necessary to lawfully perform, publish or reproduce any such Works. Licensee specifically agrees, undertakes, and assumes the responsibility to make any and all reports to such agencies and/or parties, including specifically by way of example only (and not by way of limitation) ASCAP, BMI, SAG, SESAC and other similar agencies. Licensee agrees hereby to produce evidence of such reports and payments to ASM GLOBAL, including evidence of compliance with the requirements of this paragraph to be provided to ASM GLOBAL in advance of any such Event. Provision of such evidence is a material condition of this Agreement. - (o) Licensee shall not engage in the sale and/or distribution of food and/or beverages at the Facility.
- (p) If requested by ASM GLOBAL, Licensee shall use the Facility's logo (the "Facility Logo") in all advertising controlled by or done on behalf of Licensee relating to an Event, including, but not limited to, television, internet, newspaper, magazine, and outdoor advertising. Licensee's right to use the Facility Logo shall be limited to the specific, express purpose set forth in the foregoing sentence and/or as otherwise authorized by ASM GLOBAL in writing prior to the use thereof. In connection with Licensee's use of the Facility Logo as permitted in this Section 14(o), Licensee shall use only the form of the Facility Logo as provided by ASM GLOBAL to Licensee in any artwork or other depiction thereof.
- 15. <u>Civil Rights Act.</u> During the performance of this Agreement, Licensee shall comply fully with Title VI and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, and all other regulations promulgated there under, in addition to all applicable state and local ordinances concerning Civil Rights.
- Americans With Disabilities Act. With respect to any Event at the Facility, Licensee recognizes that it is subject to the provisions of Title III of the Americans With Disabilities Act, as amended, and all similar applicable state and local laws (collectively, the "ADA"). Licensee represents that it has viewed or otherwise apprised itself of the access into the Facility, together with the common areas inside, and accepts such access, common areas, and other conditions of the Facility as adequate for Licensee's responsibilities under the ADA. Licensee acknowledges that the Facility complies and continues to comply in all respects with the ADA, including accessibility, usability, and configuration insofar as Licensee modifies, rearranges or sets up in the Facility in order to accommodate Licensee's usage. Licensee shall be responsible for any of its violations of the ADA, including, without limitation, those that arise from Licensee's reconfiguration of the seating areas or modification of other portions of the Facility in order to accommodate Licensee's usage. Licensee shall be responsible for providing auxiliary aids and services that are ancillary to its usage and for ensuring that the policies, practices, and procedures it applies in connection with an Event comply with the ADA.

- (d) <u>Severability.</u> If any provision or a portion of any provision of this Agreement is held to be unenforceable or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the validity and enforceability of the enforceable portion of any such provision and/or the remaining provisions shall not be affected thereby.
- (e) <u>Time.</u> Time is of the essence hereof, and every term, covenant, and condition shall be deemed to be of the essence hereof.
- (f) <u>Successors.</u> This Agreement shall be binding upon, and shall inure to, the benefit of the successors and assigns of ASM GLOBAL, and to such successors and assigns of Licensee as are permitted to succeed to the Licensee's right upon and subject to the terms hereof.
- (g) Independent Contractor; No Partnership. ASM GLOBAL and Licensee shall each be and remain an independent contractor with respect to all rights and obligations arising under this Agreement. - d. Disclosure of Confidential information shall not be precluded if such disclosure is: (a) required pursuant to a valid court order; or (b) in the opinion of legal counsel for Contractor, is otherwise required by law, provided that in either circumstance:

After its review of the Confidential Information Contractor will return to the District all Confidential Information disclosed to it (including copies or summaries of Confidential Information), or with the District's permission destroy the Confidential Information and certify in writing that it has been destroyed.
- 14. <u>Injunctive Relief.</u> Each Party acknowledges that a breach or threatened breach of this Agreement may cause immediate and irreparable harm to the District and that, to protect against such harm, the District may seek from a court of competent jurisdiction the issuance of a restraining order or injunction to prohibit any threatened disclosure

or misuse of the District's Confidential Information. Such an action for a restraining order or injunction is in addition to and does not limit all other remedies provided by law or in equity or by agreement between the Parties.

- 15. Indemnification and Hold Harmless. In the event "Contactor" is weiking with students individually or providing professional sorvices to students, "Contractor" shall maintain a policy providing coverage for sexual molestation and/or abuse claims. In the event that "Commeter's" Commercial General flability policy excludes coverage for sexual molestation and/or abuse claims shall be required to procure a separate or supplemental policy providing such coverage. The District shall be named as an additional insured on the policies by separate endorsement. A Certificate of Insurance and endorsements shall be attached to this Agreement as proof of insurance. The "Contractor" policy shall provide that it is primary such that insurance maintained by the District, if any, shall be excess and not co-primary.

- 17. Independent Contractor Status, While engaged in carrying out the terms and conditions of the contract, the Contractor is an independent contractor, and not an officer, employee, agent, partner, or joint venture of the District.
- 18. Workers' Compensation Insurance, Contractor agrees to provide all necessary workers' compensation insurance for Contractor's employees, If any, at Contractor's own cost and expense.
- 19. Fingorprinting Requirements. Contractor hereby acknowledges that, if applicable, it is required to comply with the requirements of Education Code Scotlon 45125.1 with respect to fingerprinting of employees who may have contact with the District's pupils. The Contractor shall also ensure that its consultants on the Project also comply with the requirements of Section 45125.1, If required by Education Code Section 45125.1, the Contractor and its consultants, prior to any of the Contractor 's employees, or those of any other consultants, coming into contact with the District's pupils submit through the DISTRICT fingerprints to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the monitoring and supervision of employee(s) and/or affillated constituents. Contractor will not begin work on the Project site until obtaining a DOJ cleared status through the DISTRICT. Contractor further acknowledges that other fingerprinting requirements may apply, as set forth in Education Code Section 45125 et seq., and will comply with any such requirements, including having Consultant certifies Consultants certify that none of these employees and/or affiliated constituent(s) will have been convicted of a felony as defined in Education Code section 45122.1."Pingerprinting Requirements," is expressly understood and agreed to by the parties hereto:

- 23. Severability. If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision hereof.
- 24. Walyor and Amendments, This Agreement may be amended, modified, superseded, cancelled, renewed or extended, and the terms and conditions hereof may be waived, only by a written instrument signed by the parties or, in the case of a walver, by the party waiving compliance. The waiver by any party hereto of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not operate or be construed as a walver of any subsequent breach.
- 25. Governing Law, This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California and venue shall be in the appropriate Superior court in Presno, California.

TITLE AND SUBJECT: Approve Vendor Designation Per Request for Qualifications 24-05S, Special Education Services

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Included in the Board binders is information on Request for Qualifications (RFQ) 24-05S, Special Education Services. The Board approved the RFQ on February 21, 2024, to qualify vendors for services such as Speech Language Pathologist, Speech Language Pathologist Assistant, Inclusion Specialist, Sign Language Interpreter, Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapist, Orientation and Mobility Specialist, Adapted Physical Education Specialist, Orthopedic Impairment Specialist, Academic Tutoring, Registered Behavior Technician, Board Certified Behavior Analyst, School Psychologist, Psychologist, Paraeducator, Non-Public School Education, Behavior Interventionist, and Educationally-Related Mental Health Services provider in the categories of Professional Development and Indirect/Direct Student Services. The term is for five years and will begin upon Board approval through February 21, 2029.

These current vendor designations are the result from the need of additional vendor submittals. This supplemental round closed on February 16, 2024, and all vendor designations are consistent with the evaluation and selection process set forth in the RFQ.

Successful implementation and delivery of services will include documented delivery of services, improved graduation rates for students with special education services, and improved Individualized Education Program compliance. Category A is intended to serve up to 315 Fresno Unified employees for professional learning. Category B will be utilized to serve up to 10,237 students with Special Education Services; such services will only be requested if there are needs due to shortages of qualified Fresno Unified staff at the elementary, middle, and high schools.

Category A, Professional Development (10 qualified vendors) Estimated amount \$1,500,000.

Category B, Indirect/Direct Student Services (10 qualified vendors) Estimated amount \$20,000,000.

Purchase orders for services provided by approved vendors are presented to the Board for ratification on monthly reports. The RFQ, vendor proposals and scoring matrix are available for review in the Purchasing Department.

TITLE AND SUBJECT: Approve Project Labor Agreement with Fresno, Madera, Kings and Tulare Counties Building and Construction Trades Council – Aviation Academy Project

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Included in the Board binders is copy of a project labor agreement ("PLA") between the District and the Fresno, Madera, Kings and Tulare Counties Building and Construction Trades Council ("Trades Council"). It is requested that the Board consider the approval of the PLA based on the terms and conditions and, if approved, direct District staff to incorporate the PLA into the bid documents for the Aviation Academy project. District staff will also be directed to take all other actions necessary to implement the PLA pursuant to its terms and conditions.

A PLA is a contract between a project owner and building trades unions in which various terms, work site conditions, worker qualifications, dispute resolution processes, etc. are negotiated prior to the beginning of a project. This PLA would cover only the Aviation Academy project, which is currently in the conceptual planning design phase.

The district has previously entered into single project PLAs with the Trades Council for the Herrera Elementary School project and the Farber Education Center project respectively. Like those PLAs, this agreement requires that the Trades Council provide career technical training opportunities internships and pre-apprenticeship opportunities that will directly benefit District students and graduates and increase the likelihood of them graduating with the skills needed to contribute and thrive in a changing world. Also, the member unions agree that they will exert their best efforts to refer and/or recruit local skilled craft workers, including city residents, local veterans, District graduates and local Multi-Craft Core Curriculum (MC3) graduates to fulfill the requirements of the employers.

If approved, the PLA will be included in the bid documents for the Aviation Academy project, and the successful bidder and all its subcontractors will be required to comply with all terms and conditions of the PLA.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY: There is no cost to the district at this time. Current funding designated for this project will come from Expanded Learning Opportunities Program funds.

PROJECT LABOR AGREEMENT

BY AND BETWEEN

FRESNO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

AND

FRESNO, MADERA, KINGS AND TULARE COUNTIES BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION TRADES COUNCIL

AND

THE SIGNATORY CRAFT COUNCILS AND UNIONS

FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE AVIATION ACADEMY PROJECT

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FRESNO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT PROJECT LABOR AGREEMENT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF THE AVIATION ACADEMY PROJECT

This Project Labor Agreement (the "Agreement") is entered into by and among the Board of Education for the Fresno Unified School District (the "District"), the Fresno, Madera, Kings and Tulare Counties Building and Construction Trades Council (the "Council"), and the signatory Craft Councils and Unions signing this Agreement (hereinafter together with the Council, collectively, the "Union" or "Unions"). This Agreement establishes the labor relations guidelines and procedures for the District and for the Contractors and craft employees represented by the Unions and engaged in Project Work. The District, Council and Unions are hereinafter referred to herein, as the context may require, as "Party" or "Parties."

The Parties to this Agreement understand that if this Agreement is acceptable to the District, the policy of the District will be for the Project Work to be contracted exclusively to Contractors who agree to execute and be bound by the terms of this Agreement, directly or through the Letter of Assent (a form of which is attached as "Attachment A"), and to require required subcontractors, of whatever tier, to become bound. The District shall include, directly or by incorporation by reference, the requirements of this Agreement in the advertisement of and/or specifications for each and every contract for Project Work to be awarded by the District.

The District shall actively administer the obligations of this Agreement by ensuring that this Agreement is part of all contracts for Project Work and by developing and implementing the programs referenced herein, all of which are critical to fulfilling the intent and purposes of the Parties and this Agreement; and to otherwise implement and assist the Council in administering this Agreement. The Council shall monitor compliance with this Agreement.

The term "Apprentice" as used in this Agreement shall mean those employees registered and participating in Joint Labor/Management Apprenticeship Programs approved by the Division of Apprenticeship Standards, Department of Industrial Relations of the State of California.

The term "Contractor(s)" or "Employer(s)" as used in this Agreement includes any individual, firm, partnership, or corporation, or combination thereof, including joint ventures, which as an Independent Contractor has entered into a contract with the District with respect to the Project Work, or with another Contractor as a subcontractor of whatever tier utilized by such Contractors for Project Work.

The term "Joint Labor/Management Apprenticeship Program" as used in this Agreement means a joint Union and Contractor administered apprenticeship program certified by the Division of Apprenticeship Standards, Department of Industrial Relations of the State of California.

The term "Letter of Assent" as used in this Agreement means the document that each Contractor (of any tier) must sign and submit to the District and the Council, before beginning any Project Work, which formally binds them to adhere to all the forms, requirements and conditions of this Agreement, in the letter attached hereto as Attachment A.

The term "**Project**" or "**Project Work**" as used in this Agreement means the District's Aviation Academy project.

The term "Master Labor Agreement" or "MLA" as used in this Agreement, means the local collective bargaining agreements of the signatory Unions having jurisdiction over the Project Work and which have signed this Agreement.

The Union and all Contractors agree to abide by the terms and conditions of this Agreement and agree that this Agreement represents the complete understanding of the Parties. No Contractor is or will be required to sign or otherwise become a party to any other collective bargaining agreement with a signatory Union as a condition of performing work within the scope of this Agreement.

The Parties agree that this Agreement will be made available to, and will fully apply to, any successful bidder for Project Work, without regard to whether that successful bidder performs work at other sites on either a union or non-union basis. This Agreement shall not apply to any work of any Contractor other than that on Project Work specifically covered by this Agreement.

The use of masculine or feminine gender or titles in this Agreement should be construed as including both genders and not as gender limitations unless the Agreement clearly requires a different construction. Further, the use of Article titles and/or Section headings are for information only and carry no legal significance.

ARTICLE 1 INTENT AND PURPOSE

Section 1.1 <u>Background:</u> The District's new construction and major rehabilitation projects will affect the school buildings and offices that are owned, leased or controlled by the District. The goal of this Project is to provide new construction and major rehabilitation of the District's facilities at the Project site so as to provide sufficient facilities and technologies to educate properly the children within the District's boundaries. The District, therefore, wishing to utilize the most modern, efficient and effective procedures for construction, including assurances of a sufficient supply of skilled craftsperson's, and the elimination of disruptions or interference with Project Work, adopts this Agreement in the best interests of the students, parents, District staff, and the taxpayers of the District to meet the District's goal that Project Work be completed on time and within budget.

Section 1.2 <u>Identification and Retention of Skilled Labor and Employment of District Residents:</u> The vast amount of new school construction, substantial rehabilitation, and capital improvement work scheduled to be performed by the District will require large numbers of craft personnel and other supporting workers. The parties understand and intend to use the opportunities provided by the extensive amount of work to be covered by this Agreement to identify and promote, through cooperative efforts, programs and procedures (which may include, for example, programs to prepare persons for entrance into formal apprenticeship programs, or

outreach programs to the community describing opportunities available as a result of the Project), the interest and involvement of District residents in the construction industry; assist them in entering the construction trades, and through utilization of the joint labor/management sponsored apprenticeship programs, provide training opportunities for those District residents and other individuals wishing to pursue a career in construction. Further, the District, the contractors, the Unions and their affiliated regional and national organizations, will work jointly to develop and implement procedures promptly for the identification of craft needs, the scheduling of work to facilitate the utilization of available craft workers, and to secure the services of craft workers in sufficient numbers to meet the high demands of the Project Work to be undertaken.

Section 1.3 Encouragement of Local and Small Business: The Project will provide many opportunities for local and small business enterprises to participate as contractors or suppliers, and the parties therefore agree that they will cooperate with all efforts of the District, and other organizations retained by the District for the purpose of encouraging and assisting the participation of local and small businesses in Project Work. Specifically, all parties understand that the District has established and quantified goals which place a strong emphasis on the utilization of local and small businesses on the Project. Each party agrees that it shall employ demonstrable efforts to encourage utilization in an effort to achieve such goals. This may include, for example, participation in outreach programs, education and assistance to businesses not familiar with working on a project of this scope, and the encouragement of local residents to participate in Project Work through programs and procedures jointly developed to prepare and encourage such local residents for apprenticeship programs and formal employment on the Project through the referral programs sponsored and/or supported by the parties to this Agreement. Further, the parties shall ensure that the provisions of this Agreement do not inadvertently establish impediments to the participation of local and small businesses, and residents of the District.

<u>Project Cooperation:</u> The parties recognize that the construction to take place Section 1.4 under this Agreement involves unique and special circumstances which dictate the need for the parties to develop specific procedures to promote high quality, rapid and uninterrupted construction methods and practices. The smooth operation and successful and timely completion of the work is vitally important to the parents and the students of the District. The parties therefore agree that maximum cooperation among all parties involved is required; and that with construction work of this magnitude, with multiple contractors and crafts performing work on multiple sites of over an extended period of time, all parties agree to work in a spirit of harmony and cooperation, and with an overriding commitment to maintain the continuity of Project Work. Further, the parties recognize that a force majeure event, a default or a termination of a construction contract could require the District to partially or fully suspend Project Work. The parties shall fully cooperate with any request by the District to redirect their equipment, skills and expertise to support the District's efforts necessitated by such events.

Section 1.5 Workers' Compensation Carve-out: Further, the parties recognize the potential which the Project may provide for the implementation of a cost effective workers' compensation system as permitted by California Labor Code, Section 3201.5, as revised. Should the District request, the Union parties agree to meet and negotiate in good faith with representatives of the

District for the development, and subsequent implementation, of an effective program involving improved and revised dispute resolution and medical care procedures for the delivery of workers' compensation benefits and medical coverage as permitted by the Code.

- Section 1.6 <u>Peaceful Resolution of All Disputes:</u> In recognition of the special needs of the Project and to maintain a spirit of harmony, labor-management peace and stability during the term of this Project Labor Agreement, the parties agree to establish effective and binding methods for the settlement of all misunderstandings, disputes and grievances; and in recognition of such methods and procedures, the unions agree not to engage in any strike, slowdowns or interruptions or disruption of Project Work, and the contractors agree not to engage in any lockout, or any other action impairing or impeding the Project Work.
- Section 1.7 Binding Agreement on Parties and Inclusion of District Residents and Businesses: By executing this Agreement, the District, Council, Unions and Contractors agree to be bound by each and all of the provisions of this Agreement, and pledge that they will work together to adopt, develop and implement processes and procedures which are inclusive of the residents and businesses of the District.

ARTICLE 2 SCOPE OF AGREEMENT

General: This Agreement shall only apply to work which is contracted out by the Section 2.1 District. This Agreement shall apply and is limited to all of the District's Project Work, as specified in Section 2.2 of this Article, performed by those Contractor(s) of whatever tier that have contracts awarded for such work, for the development of the District's facilities which, jointly, constitute the Project, and have been designated by the District for construction or rehabilitation.

Section 2.2 Covered Work:

- Specific: The Project is defined and limited to the District's Aviation Academy Project; however, carved out of this Agreement are all prime contracts and subcontracts flowing from that work that are One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) or less with a cap on the carve out of five percent (5%) of the construction cost estimate for the Project. The cap shall not to be absorbed by any single craft.
- Except for the delivery of supplies, equipment or materials that are stockpiled for (b) later use, this Agreement covers all construction trucking work, including the hauling and delivery of ready-mix, asphalt, aggregate, sand, soil or other fill or similar material that is directly incorporated into the construction process as well as the off-hauling of soil, sand, gravel, rocks, concrete, asphalt, excavation materials, construction debris and excess fill, material and/or mud. To the fullest extent allowed by prevailing wage law and determinations of the California Department of Industrial Relations, Contractor(s), including brokers, of persons providing construction trucking work, shall provide certified payroll records to the District within ten (10) days of written request or as required by the bid specifications.

- (c) The Parties understand that the District may at any time, and at its sole discretion, determine to build segments of the Project under this Agreement which were not currently proposed, or to modify or not to build any one or more particular segments proposed to be covered. It is understood by the Parties that the District may at any time, and at its sole discretion, add additional projects under this Agreement not otherwise covered by this Agreement.
- Section 2.3 <u>Bundling of Contracts:</u> The Parties understand that, to the maximum extent feasible, and consistent with goals of the District to utilize the services of small and local business enterprises for such construction and rehabilitation work, that Project Work will not be split, divided or otherwise separated for contract award purposes to avoid application of this Agreement.
- Section 2.4 <u>Exclusions:</u> Items specifically excluded from the Scope of this Agreement include the following:
 - (a) Work of Contractor's non-manual employees, including but not limited to: superintendents; administrators; teachers; supervisors; time keepers; mail carriers; clerks; office workers; messengers; guards; safety personnel; emergency medical and first aid technicians; other professional, engineering, and supervisors above the level of general foreman; management employees; executives; and employees performing services for which a prevailing wage has not been established by the Department of Industrial Relations.
 - (b) Equipment and machinery owned or controlled and operated by the District;
 - (c) All off-site manufacture and handling of materials, equipment or machinery unless either of the following apply:
 - it is a lay down or storage area for equipment or material and manufacturing (prefabrication) sites, dedicated solely to the Project or Project Work; or
 - the work is traditionally performed by any Union(s) that is directly or indirectly part of the Project and is covered by a provision of a local MLA or local addenda to a National Agreement of the applicable Union(s) that is in effect as of the execution date of this Agreement.
- (d) All employees of the District, design teams (including, but not limited to architects engineers and master planners), or any other consultants for the District (including, but not limited to, project managers and construction managers and their employees not engaged in Project Work) and their sub-consultants, and other employees of professional service organizations, not performing manual labor within the scope of this Agreement; Project Work as defined by this Agreement shall be performed pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement regardless of the manner in which the work was awarded;

- (e) Any work performed on or near or leading to or into a site of work covered by this Agreement and undertaken by state, county, city or other governmental bodies, or their Contractors; or by public utilities, or their Contractors; and/or by the District or its Contractors (for work for which is not within the scope of this Agreement);
 - (f) Off-site maintenance of leased equipment and on-site supervision of such work;
- (g) It is recognized that certain materials, equipment and systems of a highly technical and specialized nature will have to be installed at the Project. The nature of the materials, equipment and systems, together with requirements of manufacturer's or vendor's warranty, may dictate that it be prefabricated, pre-piped, and/or pre-wired and that it be installed under the supervision and direction of Owner's and/or manufacturer's personnel. The Unions agree to install such material, equipment and systems without incident. In limited circumstances requiring special knowledge of the particular item(s), the installation of specialty process equipment or systems may be performed by employees of a manufacturer, or by designated representatives of the manufacturer, if necessary to maintain the manufacturer's warranty or guarantee, provided, however, that the manufacturer can demonstrate by an enumeration of specific tasks that the work cannot be performed by craft workers covered by this Agreement;
- (h) Non-construction support services contracted by the District or Contractor in connection with this Project;
 - (i) Laboratory work for testing.
- (j) The District shall not be required to comply with this Agreement for any work performed with its own forces as permitted by the Public Contract Code.

Section 2.5 Awarding of Contracts:

- (a) The District has the absolute right to award contracts on this Project to any Contractor notwithstanding the existence or non-existence of any agreements between such Contractor and any Union parties, provided only that such Contractor and its subcontractors are ready, willing and able to execute and comply with this Project Labor Agreement should such Contractor be awarded work covered by this Agreement.
- (b) It is agreed that all Contractors and subcontractors of whatever tier, who have been awarded contracts for work covered by this Agreement, shall be required to accept and be bound to the terms and conditions of this Project Labor Agreement, and shall evidence their acceptance by the execution of the Letter of Assent set forth in **Attachment "A"** hereto, prior to the commencement of work. At the time that any Contractor enters into a subcontract with any subcontractor of any tier providing for the performance on the construction contract, the Contractor shall provide a copy of this Agreement to said subcontractor and shall require the subcontractor, as a part of accepting the award of a construction subcontract, to agree in writing in the form of a Letter of Assent to be bound by each and every provision of this Agreement prior to the commencement of work on the Project. No Contractor or subcontractor shall commence Project Work without having first provided a copy of the Letter of Assent as executed

by it to the District and to the Council forty-eight (48) hours before the commencement of Project Work, or within forty-eight (48) hours after the award of Project Work to that Contractor (or subcontractor), whichever occurs later.

Section 2.6 <u>Coverage Exception:</u> This Agreement shall not apply if the District receives funding or assistance from any Federal, State, local or other public entity for the Construction Contract if a requirement, condition or other term of receiving that funding or assistance, at the time of the awarding of the contract, is that the District not require, bidders, contractors, subcontractors or other persons or entities to enter into an agreement with one or more labor organizations or enter into an agreement that contains any of the terms set forth herein. The District agrees that it will make every effort to establish the enforcement of this Agreement with any governmental agency or granting authority.

MLAs: Section 2.7

- The provisions of this Agreement, including the Master Labor Agreements (which are the local collective bargaining agreements of the signatory Unions having jurisdiction over the work on the Project, as such may be changed from time-to-time and which are incorporated herein by reference) shall apply to the work covered by this Agreement, notwithstanding the provisions of any other local, area and/or national agreement which may conflict with or differ from the terms of this Agreement. However, such does not apply to work performed under the National Cooling Tower Agreement, the National Stack Agreement, the National Transit Division Agreement (NTD), or within the jurisdiction of the International Union of Elevator Constructors and all instrument calibration and loop checking work performed under the terms of the UA/IBEW Joint National Agreement for Instrument and Control Systems Technicians except that Articles dealing with Work Stoppages and Lock-Outs, Work Assignments and Jurisdictional Disputes, and Settlement of Grievances and Disputes shall apply to such work. It is specifically agreed that no later agreement shall be deemed to have precedence over this Agreement unless signed by all Parties signatory hereto who are then currently employed or represented at the Project. Where a subject covered by the provisions of this Agreement is also covered by a MLA. the provisions of this Agreement shall apply. Where a subject is covered by a provision of a MLA and not covered by this Agreement, the provisions of the MLA shall prevail. Any dispute as to the applicable source between this Agreement and any MLA for determining the wages, hours of working conditions of employees on this Project shall be resolved under the procedures established in Article 10.
- It is understood that this Agreement, together with the referenced MLAs, constitutes a self-contained, stand-alone agreement and by virtue of having become bound to this Project Labor Agreement, the Contractor will not be obligated to sign any other local, area or national collective bargaining agreement as a condition of performing work within the scope of this Agreement. It shall be the responsibility of the prime Contractor to have each of its subcontractors sign such Agreement with the appropriate Craft Union prior to the subcontractor beginning Project Work.
- Section 2.8 Binding Signatories Only: This Agreement shall only be binding on the signatory Parties hereto, and shall not apply to the parents, affiliates, subsidiaries, or other ventures of any

such Party.

- Other District Work: This Agreement shall be limited to the construction work Section 2.9 within the Scope of this Agreement including, specifically, site preparation and related demolition work, and new construction and major rehabilitation work for new or existing facilities referenced in Section 2.2 above. Nothing contained herein shall be interpreted to prohibit, restrict, or interfere with the performance of any other operation, work or function not covered by this Agreement, which may be performed by District employees or contracted for by the District for its own account, on its property or in and around a Project site.
- Section 2.10 Separate Liability: It is understood that the liability of the Contractor(s) and the liability of the separate Unions under this Agreement shall be several and not joint. The Unions agree that this Agreement does not have the effect of creating any joint employment status between or among the District and/or any Contractor.
- Section 2.11 Completed Project Work: As areas of Project Work are accepted by the District, this Agreement shall have no further force or effect on such items or areas except where the Contractor is directed by the District or its representatives to engage in repairs, modification, check-out and/or warranties functions required by its contract(s) with the District.

ARTICLE 3 UNION RECOGNITION AND EMPLOYMENT

- Section 3.1 Recognition: The Contractor recognizes the Council and the Unions as the exclusive bargaining representative for the employees engaged in Project Work.
- Contractor Selection of Employees: The Contractor shall have the right to determine the competency of all employees, the number of employees required, the duties of such employees within their craft jurisdiction, and shall have the sole responsibility for selecting employees to be laid off, consistent with Section 3.3 and Section 4.3, below. The Contractor shall also have the right to reject any applicant referred by a Union for any reason, subject to any reporting pay required by Section 6.6; provided, however, that such right is exercised in good faith and not for the purpose of avoiding the Contractor's commitment to employ qualified workers through the procedures endorsed in this Agreement.

Section 3.3 Referral Procedures:

For signatory Unions now having a job referral system contained in a MLA, the Contractor agrees to comply with such system and it shall be used exclusively by such Contractor, except as modified by this Agreement. Such job referral system will be operated in a nondiscriminatory manner and in full compliance with federal, state, and local laws and regulations which require equal employment opportunities and non-discrimination. All of the foregoing hiring procedures, including related practices affecting apprenticeship, shall be operated so as to consider the goals of the District to encourage employment of District residents and utilization of small local businesses on the Project, and to facilitate the ability of all Contractors to meet their employment needs.

- Skilled Workforce: The Unions will exert their best efforts to recruit and refer (b) sufficient numbers of skilled craft workers to fulfill the labor requirements of the Contractor, including specific employment obligations to which the Contractor may be legally and/or contractually obligated; and to refer apprentices as requested to develop a larger, skilled workforce. The Unions will work with their affiliated regional and national unions, and jointly with the District, to identify and refer competent craft persons as needed for Project Work, and to identify and hire individuals, particularly residents of the District, for entrance into joint labor/management apprenticeship programs, or to participation in other identified programs and procedures to assist individuals in qualifying and becoming eligible for such apprenticeship programs, all maintained to increase the available supply of skilled craft personnel for Project Work and future construction of maintenance work to be undertaken by the District.
- (c) The Union shall not knowingly refer an employee currently employed by a Contractor on Project Work to any other Contractor.
- Fingerprinting and Megan's Law: The Parties are aware of the District's policy (d) that Contractors and other employers shall not employ, on Project Work when pupils may be present on or around the site of such Project Work during working hours, a person who would not be eligible for employment by the District under California Education Code sections 45125.1 and 45125.2 or a person listed on California's "Megan's Law" Website (http://www.meganslaw.ca.gov/. The Parties shall only employ persons under this Article in compliance with this policy, and the Contractors agree to immediately remove such an individual in their employ from the particular Project site.
- Non-Discrimination in Referral, Employment, and Contracting. The Unions (e) and Contractors agree that they will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment in hiring and dispatching on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, gender, national origin, age, membership in a labor organization, sexual orientation, political affiliation, marital status or disability. Further, it is recognized that the District has certain policies, programs, and goals for the utilization of local small business enterprises. The Parties shall jointly endeavor to assure that these commitments are fully met, and that any provisions of this Agreement which may appear to interfere within a local and small business enterprises successfully bidding for work within the scope of this Agreement shall be carefully reviewed, and adjustments made as may be appropriate and agreed upon among the Parties, to ensure full compliance with the spirit and letter of the District's policies and commitment to its goals for the significant utilization of local and small businesses as direct Contractors or suppliers for Project Work.

(f) Goals for Employment of District Local Residents and Other Persons.

In recognition of the fact that the District and the communities surrounding Project Work will be impacted by the construction of the Project, the parties agree to support the hiring of specific categories of workers. The Unions and Employers agree that, to the maximum extent allowed by law, and as long as they possess the requisite skills and qualifications, the Unions will exert their best efforts to refer and/or recruit sufficient numbers of skilled craft from the following categories to fulfill the requirements of the Employers:

- Local Residents. Residents living in the First Tier as defined below.
- Veterans in the Area. Veterans, not dishonorably discharged, who are residents living in the First Tier, Second Tier or Third Tier.
- District Graduates in the Area. Persons who received a High School Diploma ("Student Graduates") from the District within the past twenty (20) years and who are residents living in the First Tier, Second Tier or Third Tier.
- MC3 Graduates in the Area. Persons who have received a completion certificate from an apprenticeship preparation program utilizing the multicraft core curriculum ("MC3") and who are residents living in the First Tier, Second Tier or Third Tier.
- (ii) **First Tier.** Residents residing in those First Tier zip codes which cover the District service area, as set forth in "Attachment B" attached hereto ("Local Residents").
- (iii) **Second Tier.** If the Unions cannot provide the Employers in the attainment of a sufficient number of Local Residents from within the First Tier zip codes, the Unions shall exert their best efforts to then recruit and identify for referral residents residing in Second Tier zip codes which reflect the Gateway Cities, as set forth in "Attachment B" attached hereto.
- **Third Tier.** If the Unions still have not provided the Employers in the attainment of a sufficient number of qualified workers who are residents living in the First Tier or Second Tier, the Unions will then exert their best efforts to recruit and identify for referral qualified workers residing within the Fresno, Madera, Kings and Tulare Counties.
- 40% Goal. A goal of 40% of all of the labor and craft positions shall be from Local Residents living in the First Tier. Only if a Union cannot dispatch Local Residents living in the First Tier after using its best efforts, can that Union look to persons living in the Second Tier; and only if a Union cannot dispatch persons living in the Second Tier after using its best efforts, can that Union look to residents living in the Third Tier. To facilitate the dispatch of Local Residents, all Contractors will be required to utilize the Craft Employee Request Form whenever they are requesting the referral of any employee from a Union referral list for any Project Work, a sample of which is attached as **Attachment "C."**
- The District shall work with the Unions and Contractors in the (vi) administration of the goals for Local Residents and Other Persons; and the Contractors and Unions shall cooperate by maintaining adequate records to demonstrate to the District that such goals have been pursued. As part of this process, and in order to facilitate the contract administration procedures, as well as appropriate benefit fund coverage, all Contractors shall require their "core work force" and any other persons employed other than through the referral process, to register with the appropriate hiring hall, if any.

Section 3.6 Helmets to Hardhats: The Employers and the Unions recognize a desire to facilitate the entry into the building and construction trades of veterans who are interested in careers in the building and construction industry. The employers and Unions agree to utilize the services of the Center for Military Recruitment, Assessment and Veterans Employment (hereinafter "Center") and the Center's "Helmets to Hardhats" program to serve as a resource for preliminary orientation, assessment of construction aptitude, referral to apprenticeship programs or hiring halls, counseling and mentoring, support network, employment opportunities and other needs as identified by the Parties. For purposes of this Agreement, the term "Eligible Veteran" shall have the same meaning as the term "veteran" as defined under Title 5, Section 2108(1) of the United States Code as the same may be amended or re-codified from time to time. It shall be the responsibility of each qualified District resident to provide the Unions with proof of his/her status as an Eligible Veteran.

The Unions and Employers agree to coordinate with the Center to create and maintain an integrated database of veterans interested in working on this Project and of apprenticeship and employment opportunities for this Project. To the extent permitted by law, the Unions will give credit to such veterans for bona fide, provable past experience.

Section 3.7 Core Employees:

- Contractors which are not independently signatory to a Master Labor Agreement may first employ, as needed, two (2) members of his core workforce, then, as needed, two (2) employees through a referral from the appropriate Union hiring hall. After those initial four (4) employees, the Contractors may employ, as needed, then one (1) more core employee, then one (1) more employee through the referral system, and so on until a maximum of five (5) core employees are employed. Thereafter, all additional employees in the affected trade or craft shall be requisitioned from the craft hiring hall in accordance with Section 3.3. In the laying off of employees, the number of core employees shall not exceed one-half plus one of the workforce for an employer with 10 or fewer employees, assuming the remaining employees are qualified to undertake the work available. This provision applies only to Contractors which are not independently signatory to a Master Labor Agreement and is not intended to limit the transfer provisions of the MLA of any trade. As part of this process, and in order to facilitate the contract administration procedures, as well as appropriate fringe benefit fund coverage, all Contractors shall require their core employees and any other persons employed other than through the Union referral process, to register with the appropriate Union hiring hall, if any, prior to their first day of employment at a project site.
- The core work force is comprised of those employees whose names appeared on the Contractor's active payroll for sixty (60) of the one hundred (100) working days immediately before award of Project Work to the Contractor; who possess any license required by state or federal law for the Project Work to be performed; and who have the ability to safely perform the basic functions of the applicable trade.
- Prior to each Contractor performing any work on the Project, each Contractor shall provide a list of his core employees to the District and the Council. Failure to do so will

prohibit the Contractor from using any core employees. Upon request by any Party to this Agreement, the Contractor hiring any core employee shall provide satisfactory proof (i.e., payroll records, quarterly tax records, driver's license, voter registration, postal address and such other documentation) evidencing the core employee's qualification as a core employee to the District and the Council.

- Section 3.8 Time for Referral: If any Union's registration and referral system does not fulfill the requirements for specific classifications requested by any Contractor within forty-eight (48) hours (excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays), that Contractor may use employment sources other than the Union registration and referral services, and may employ applicants meeting such standards from any other available source. The Contractors shall inform the Union of any applicants hired from other sources within forty-eight (48) hours of such applicant being hired, and such applicants shall register with the appropriate hiring hall, if any.
- <u>Lack of Referral Procedure:</u> If a signatory Union does not have a job referral system as set forth in Section 3.3 above, the Contractors shall give the Union equal opportunity to refer applicants. The Contractors shall notify the Union of employees so hired, as set forth in Section 3.8.
- Section 3.10 Union Membership: The Contractors shall make and transmit all deductions for Union dues, fees, and assessments that have been authorized by employees in writing in accordance with the applicable MLA. This Agreement does not require any employee of a non-Union Contractor to join a Union or to pay dues or fees to a Union as a condition of working on the Project; however, nothing in this Article is intended to supersede the independent requirements of the applicable MLAs as to Contractors signatory to such MLAs and as to employees of those Contractors who are performing Covered Work.
- Section 3.11 Individual Seniority: Except as provided in Section 4.3, individual seniority shall not be recognized or applied to employees working on the Project; provided, however, that group and/or classification seniority in a Union's MLA as of the effective date of this Agreement shall he recognized for purposes of layoffs.
- Section 3.12 Foremen: The selection and number of craft foreman and/or general foreman shall be the responsibility of the Contractor. All foremen shall take orders exclusively from the designated Contractor representatives. Craft foreman shall be designated as working foreman at the request of the Contractors.

ARTICLE 4 UNION ACCESS AND STEWARDS

Section 4.1 Access to Project Sites: Authorized representatives of the Union shall have access to Project Work, provided that they do not interfere with the work of employees and further provided that such representatives fully comply with posted visitor, security and safety rules.

Section 4.2 Stewards:

- Each signatory Union shall have the right to dispatch a working journeyperson as a steward for each shift, who should be the first non-core worker dispatched pursuant to the Section 3.7 herein, and shall notify the Contractor in writing of the identity of the designated steward or stewards prior to the assumption of such person's duties as steward. Such designated steward or stewards shall not exercise any supervisory functions. There will be no non-working stewards. Stewards will receive the regular rate of pay for their respective crafts.
- In addition to his/her work as an employee, the steward should have the right to receive, but not to solicit, complaints or grievances and to discuss and assist in the adjustment of the same with the employee's appropriate supervisor. Each steward should he concerned only with the employees of the steward's Contractor and, if applicable, subcontractor(s), and not with the employees of any other Contractor. A Contractor will not discriminate against the steward in the proper performance of his/her Union duties.
- When a Contractor has multiple, non-contiguous work locations at one site, the (c) Contractor may request, and the Union shall appoint, such additional working stewards as the Contractor requests to provide independent coverage of one or more such locations. In such cases, a steward may not service more than one work location without the approval of the Contractor.
- The stewards shall not have the right to determine when overtime shall be worked (d) or who shall work overtime.
- Section 4.3 Steward Layoff/Discharge: The relevant Contractor agrees to notify the appropriate Union twenty-four (24) hours before the layoff of a steward, except in the case of disciplinary discharge for just cause. If the steward is protected against such layoff by the provisions of the applicable MLA, such provisions shall be recognized when the steward possesses the necessary qualifications to perform the remaining work. In any case in which the steward is discharged or disciplined for just cause, the appropriate Union will be notified immediately by the Contractor, and such discharge or discipline shall not become final (subject to any later filed grievance) until twenty-four (24) hours after such notice has been given.
- Section 4.4 Employees on Non-Project Work: On work where the personnel of the District may be working in close proximity to the construction activities covered by this Agreement, the Union agrees that the Union representatives, stewards, and individual workers will not interfere with the District personnel, or with personnel employed by the any other employer not a Party to this Agreement.

ARTICLE 5 WAGES AND BENEFITS

Wages: All employees covered by this Agreement shall be classified in Section 5.1 accordance with work performed and paid by the Contractors the hourly wage rates for those classifications in compliance with the applicable prevailing wage rate determination established pursuant to applicable law. If a prevailing rate increases under law, the Contractor shall pay that rate as of its effective date under the law. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, this Agreement does not relieve Contractors directly signatory to one or more of the MLA from paying all wages set forth in such Agreements.

Section 5.2 Benefits:

- Contractors shall pay contributions to the established employee benefit funds in (a) the amounts designated in the appropriate MLA and make all employee authorized deductions in the amounts designated in the appropriate MLA; provided, however, that such contributions shall not exceed the contribution amounts set forth in the applicable prevailing wage determination. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, Contractors directly signatory to one or more of the MLAs are required to make all contributions set forth in those MLAs without reference to the forgoing. Bona fide benefit plans with joint trustees or authorized employee deduction programs established or negotiated under the applicable MLA or by the Parties to this Agreement during the life of this Agreement may be added.
- The Contractor adopts and agrees to be bound by the written terms of the applicable, legally established, trust agreement(s) specifying the detailed basis on which payments are to be made into, and benefits paid out of, such trust funds for its employees. The Contractor authorizes the Parties to such trust funds to appoint trustees and successor trustees to administer the trust funds and hereby ratifies and accepts the trustees so appointed as if made by the Contractor.
- Section 5.3 Wage Premiums: Wage premiums, including but not limited to pay based on height of work, hazard pay, scaffold pay and special skills shall not be applicable to work under this Agreement, except to the extent provided for in any applicable prevailing wage determination.
- Compliance with Prevailing Wage Laws: All complaints regarding possible Section 5.4 prevailing wage violations shall be referred to the Council for processing, investigation and resolution, and if not resolved within thirty (30) calendar days or if there is a disagreement by any party with the Council's determination, that complaint may be referred by any party to the California Labor Commissioner.

ARTICLE 6 HOURS OF WORK, OVERTIME, SHIFTS AND HOLIDAYS

(The provisions in this Article 6 apply unless they conflict with the provisions in the District's contract with the Contractor, in which case the District's contract controls.)

Section 6.1 Hours of Work: Eight (8) hours per day between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 5:30 p.m., plus one-half (½) hour unpaid lunch approximately mid-way through the shift, shall constitute the standard work day. Forty (40) hours per week shall constitute a regular week's work. The work week will start on Sunday and conclude on Saturday. The foregoing provisions of this Article are applicable unless otherwise provided in the applicable prevailing wage

determination, or unless changes are permitted by law and such are agreed upon by the Parties. Nothing herein shall be construed as guaranteeing any employee eight (8) hours per day or forty (40) hours per week, or a Monday through Friday work standard work schedule.

- Section 6.2 <u>Place of Work:</u> Employees shall be at their place of work (as designated by the Contractor) at the starting time and shall remain at their place of work, performing their assigned functions, until quitting time. The place of work is defined as the gang or tool box or equipment at the employee's assigned work location or the place where the foreman gives instructions. The Parties reaffirm their policy of a fair day's work for a fair day's wage. There shall be no pay for time not worked unless the employee is otherwise engaged at the direction of the Contractor.
- Section 6.3 Overtime: Overtime shall be paid in accordance with the requirements of the applicable prevailing wage determination. There shall be no restriction on the Contractor's scheduling of overtime or the nondiscriminatory designation of employees who will work overtime. There shall be no pyramiding of overtime (payment of more than one form of overtime compensation for the same hour) under any circumstances.

Section 6.4 Shifts and Alternate Work Schedules:

- (a) Alternate starting and quitting time and/or shift work may be performed at the option of the Contractor upon three (3) days' prior notice to the affected Union(s), unless a shorter notice period is provided for in the applicable MLA, and shall continue for a period of not less than five (5) working days. Saturdays and Sundays, if worked, may be used for establishing the five (5) day minimum work shift. If two shifts are worked, each shall consist of eight (8) hours of continuous work exclusive of a one-half (1/2) hour non-paid lunch period, for eight (8) hours pay. The last shift shall start on or before 6:00 p.m. The first shift starting at or after 6:00 a.m. is designated as the first shift, with the second shift following.
- (b) Contractors, the Council and the Union recognize the economic impact upon the District and District residents of the massive Project being undertaken by the District and agree that all Parties to this Agreement desire and intend Project Work to be undertaken in a cost efficient and effective manner to the highest standard of quality and craftsmanship. Recognizing the economic conditions, the Parties agree that, except to the extent permitted by law, employees performing Project Work shall not be entitled to any differentials or additional pay based upon the shift or work schedule of the employees. Instead, all employees working on Project Work shall be paid at the same base rate regardless of shift or work schedule worked.
- Because of operational necessities, the second shift may, at the District's direction, be scheduled without the preceding shift having been worked. It is recognized that the District's operations and/or mitigation obligations may require restructuring of normal work schedules. Except in an emergency or when specified in the District's bid specification, the Contractor shall give affected Union(s) at least three (3) days' notice of such schedule changes.
- Section 6.5 Holidays: Recognized holidays on this Project shall be those set forth and governed by the prevailing wage determination(s) applicable to this Project, unless or until such may be, and are, revised by mutual agreement of the Parties to this Agreement.

Section 6.6 Show-up Pay:

- Except as otherwise required by State law, Employees reporting for work and for whom no work is provided, except when given prior notification not to report to work, shall receive two (2) hours pay at the regular straight time hourly rate. Employees who are directed to start work shall receive four (4) hours of pay at the regular straight time hourly rate. Employees who work beyond four (4) hours shall be paid for actual hours worked. Whenever reporting pay is provided for employees, they will be required to remain at the Project Site and available for work for such time as they receive pay, unless released earlier by the principal supervisor of the Contractor(s) or his/her designated representative. Each employee shall furnish his/her Contractor with his/her current address and telephone number and shall promptly report any changes to the Contractor.
- An employee called out to work outside of his/her shift shall receive a minimum of two (2) hours pay at the appropriate rate. This does not apply to time worked as an extension of (before or after) the employee's normal shift.
- When an employee leaves the job or work location of his/her own volition or is discharged for cause or is not working as a result of the Contractor's invocation of Article XII, Section 12.3, the employee shall only be paid for actual time worked.
- Section 6.7 Meal Periods: The Contractor will schedule a meal period of no more than onehalf hour duration at the work location at approximately mid-point of the schedule shift; provided, however, that the Contractor may, for efficiency of the operation, establish a schedule which coordinates the meal periods of two or more crafts. An employee may be required to work through his meal period because of an emergency or a threat to life or property, or for such other reasons as are in the applicable MLA, and if he is so required, he shall be compensated in the manner established in the applicable MLA.
- Section 6.8 Make-up Days: To the extent permitted by the applicable general wage determination, when an employee has been prevented from working for reasons beyond the control of the employer, including, but not limited to inclement weather or other natural causes, during the regularly scheduled work week, a make-up day may be worked on a non-regularly scheduled work day for which an employee shall receive eight (8) hours pay at the straight time rate of pay or any premium rate required for such hours under the prevailing wage law.

ARTICLE 7 WORK STOPPAGES AND LOCK-OUTS

Section 7.1 No Work Stoppages or Disruptive Activity: The Council and the Unions agree that neither they, and each of them, nor their respective officers or agents or representatives, shall incite or encourage, condone or participate in any strike, walk-out, slow-down, picketing, observing picket lines or other activity of any nature or kind whatsoever, for any cause or dispute whatsoever with respect to or in any way related to Project Work, or which interferes with or otherwise disrupts Project Work, or with respect to or related to the District or Contractors or

subcontractors, including, but not limited to economic strikes, unfair labor practice strikes, safety strikes, sympathy strikes and jurisdictional strikes whether or not the underlying dispute is subject to arbitration. Any such actions by the Council, or Unions, or their members, agents, representatives or the employees they represent shall constitute a violation of this Agreement. The Council and the Union shall take all steps necessary to obtain compliance with this Article and neither should be held liable for conduct for which it is not responsible.

- Section 7.2 Employee Violations: The Contractor may discharge any employee violating Section 7.1 above and any such employee will not be eligible for rehire under this Agreement.
- Section 7.3 Standing to Enforce: The District or any Contractor affected by an alleged violation of Section 7.1 shall have standing and the right to enforce the obligations established therein.
- Section 7.4 Expiration of MLA's: If the MLAs, or any local, regional, and other applicable collective bargaining agreements expire during the term of the Project, the Union(s) agree that there shall be no work disruption of any kind as described in Section 7.1 above as a result of the expiration of any such agreement(s) having application on this Project and/or failure of the involved Parties to that agreement to reach a new contract. Terms and conditions of employment established and set at the time of bid shall remain established and set. Otherwise to the extent that such agreement does expire and the Parties to that agreement have failed to reach concurrence on a new contract, work will continue on the Project on one of the following two (2) options, both of which will be offered by the Unions involved to the Contractors affected:
- Each of the Unions with a contract expiring must offer to continue working on the (a) Project under interim agreements that retain all the terms of the expiring contract, except that the Unions involved in such expiring contract may each propose wage rates and employer contribution rates to employee benefit funds under the prior contract different from what those wage rates and employer contributions rates were under the expiring contracts. The terms of the Union's interim agreement offered to Contractors will be no less favorable than the terms offered by the Union to any other employer or group of employers covering the same type of construction work in Fresno County.
- Each of the Unions with a contract expiring must offer to continue working on the (b) Project under all the terms of the expiring contract, including the wage rates and employer contribution rates to the employee benefit funds, if the Contractor affected by that expiring contract agrees to the following retroactive provisions: if a new MLA, local, regional or other applicable labor agreement for the industry having application at the Project is ratified and signed during the term of this Agreement and if such new labor agreement provides for retroactive wage increases, then each affected Contractor shall pay to its employees who performed work covered by this Agreement at the Project during the hiatus between the effective dates of such expired and new labor agreements, an amount equal to any such retroactive wage increase established by such new labor agreement, retroactive to whatever date is provided by the new labor agreement for such increase to go into effect, for each employee's hours worked on the Project during the retroactive period. All Parties agree that such affected Contractors shall be solely responsible for any retroactive payment to its employees.

- Some Contractors may elect to continue to work on the Project under the terms of (c) the interim agreement option offered under paragraph (a) above and other Contractors may elect to continue to work on the Project under the retroactivity option offered under paragraph (b) above. To decide between the two options, Contractors will be given one week after the particular labor agreement has expired or one week after the Union has personally delivered to the Contractors in writing its specific offer of terms of the interim agreement pursuant to paragraph (a) above, whichever is the later date. If the Contractor fails to timely select one of the two options, the Contractor shall be deemed to have selected option (b).
- Section 7.5 No Lockouts: Contractors shall not cause, incite, encourage, condone or participate in any lock-out of employees with respect to Project Work during the term of this Agreement. The term "lock-out" refers only to a Contractor's exclusion of employees in order to secure collective bargaining advantage, and does not refer to the discharge, termination or layoff of employees by the Contractor for any reason in the exercise of rights pursuant to any provision of this Agreement, or any other agreement, nor does "lock-out" include the District's decision to stop, suspend or discontinue any Project Work or any portion thereof for any reason.

Section 7.6 Best Efforts to End Violations:

- If a Contractor contends that there is any violation of this Article or Section 8.3, it shall notify, in writing, the Council, the involved Union(s) and the District. The Council and the leadership of the involved Union(s) will immediately instruct, order and use their best efforts to cause the cessation of any violation of the relevant Article.
- If the Union contends that any Contractor has violated this Article, it will notify (b) the Contractor and the District, setting forth the facts which the Union contends violate the Agreement, at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to invoking the procedures of Section 7.8. The District shall promptly order the involved Contractor(s) to cease any violation of the Article.
- Withholding of services for failure to pay wages and fringe benefits: Section 7.7 Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, it shall not be a violation of this Agreement for any Union to withhold the services of its members (but not the right to picket) from a particular Contractor who fails to timely pay its weekly payroll; or fails to make timely payments to the Union's Joint Labor/Management Trust Funds in accordance with the provisions of the applicable MLA.
 - In the case of nonpayment of trust fund contributions on the Project, prior to (a) withholding its members' services, the Trade Council shall give the District and the Contractor(s) three (3) business days' notice.
 - (b) In the case of nonpayment of wages on the Project or when paychecks tendered to a financial institution normally recognized to honor such paychecks will not honor such a paycheck as a result of insufficient funds, prior to withholding its members' services, the Trade Council shall give the District and the Contractor(s) one (1) business days' notice.

- (c) Notice to District and Contractor of the intent to withhold labor from the Contractor(s)' or their subcontractor's workforce for nonpayment of trust fund contributions and/or wages on the Project may be effected by overnight courier (e.g., US Priority Next Day; FedEx, etc.), by facsimile transmission, and by email.
- Section 7.8 <u>Expedited Enforcement Procedure:</u> Any party, including the District, which is an intended beneficiary of this Article, may institute the following procedures, in lieu of or in addition to any other action at law or equity, when a breach of Section 7.1, 7.5 or Section 8.3 is alleged.
- (a) The party invoking this procedure shall notify one of the arbitrators listed in section 8.2 (a) of this Agreement who shall be selected by the negotiating Parties, and whom the Parties agree shall be the permanent arbitrator under this procedure. If the permanent arbitrator is unavailable at any time, the party invoking this procedure shall notify one of the alternates selected by the Parties, in that order on an alternating basis. Notice to the arbitrator shall be by the most expeditious means available, with notices to the Parties alleged to be in violation, and to the Council if it is a Union alleged to be in violation. For purposes of this Article, written notice may be given by overnight courier (e.g., US Priority Next Day; FedEx, etc.), by facsimile transmission, by email, or hand-delivery and will be deemed effective upon receipt.
- (b) Upon receipt of said notice, the arbitrator named above or his/her alternate shall sit and hold a hearing within twenty-four (24) hours if it is contended that the violation still exists, but not sooner than twenty-four (24) hours after notice has been dispatched to the Council of the involved Union(s) and/or Contractor as required by Section 8.6, above.
- (c) The arbitrator shall notify the Parties of the place and time chosen for this hearing. Said hearing shall be completed in one session, which, with appropriate recesses at the arbitrator's discretion, shall not exceed twenty-four (24) hours unless otherwise agreed upon by all Parties. A failure of any Party or Parties to attend said hearings shall not delay the hearing of evidence or the issuance of any award by the arbitrator.
- (d) The sole issue at the hearing shall be whether or not a violation of Sections 7.1, 7.5 or Section 8.3 has in fact occurred. The arbitrator shall have no authority to consider any matter in justification, explanation or mitigation of such violation or to award damages. The Award shall be issued in writing within three (3) hours after the close of the hearing and may be issued without an opinion. If any party desires a written opinion, one shall be issued within fifteen (15) days, but its issuance shall not delay compliance with, or enforcement of, the Award. The arbitrator may order cessation of the violation of the Article and other appropriate relief, and such Award, upon issuance, shall be served on all Parties by hand or registered mail.
- (e) Such Award shall be final and binding on all Parties and may be enforced by any court of competent jurisdiction upon the filing of this Agreement and all other relevant documents referred to herein above in the following manner. Written notice of the filing of such enforcement proceedings shall be given to the other party. In any judicial proceeding to obtain a temporary order enforcing the arbitrator's Award as issued under Section 7.8(d) of this Article,

all Parties waive the right to a hearing and agree that such proceedings may be ex parte. Such agreement does not waive any Party's right to participate in a hearing for a final order of enforcement. The court's order or orders enforcing the arbitrator's award shall be served on all Parties by hand or by delivery to their address as shown on this Agreement (for a Union), as shown in their business contract for work under this Agreement (for a Contractor) and to the representing Union (for an employee), by certified mail by the Party or Parties first alleging the violation.

- Any rights created by statute or law governing arbitration proceedings inconsistent with the above procedure or which interfere with compliance hereto are hereby waived by the Parties to whom they accrue.
- The fees and expenses of the arbitrator shall be equally divided between the party or Parties initiating this procedure and the respondent Party or Parties.

ARTICLE 8 WORK ASSIGNMENTS AND JURISDICTIONAL DISPUTES

- Section 8.1 Assignment of Work: The assignment of Project Work will be solely the responsibility of the Employer performing the work involved; and such work assignments will be in accordance with the Plan for the Settlement of Jurisdictional Disputes in the Construction Industry (the "Plan") or any successor Plan.
- Section 8.2 The Plan: All jurisdictional disputes on this Project between or among the building and construction trades Unions and the Employers parties to this Agreement, shall be settled and adjusted according to the present Plan established by the Building and Construction Trades Department or any other plan or method of procedure that may be adopted in the future by the Building and Construction Trades Department. Decisions rendered shall be final, binding and conclusive on the Employers and Unions parties to this Agreement.
- <u>Carpenters</u>. If a dispute arising under this Article involves the Northern California Carpenters Regional Council or any of its subordinate bodies, an Arbitrator shall be chosen by the procedures specified in Article V, Section 5, of the Plan from a list composed of John Kagel, Thomas Angelo, Robert Hirsch, and Thomas Pagan. The Arbitrator's hearing on the dispute shall be held at the offices of the applicable Building and Construction Trades Council within fourteen (14) days of the selection of the Arbitrator. All other procedures shall be as specified in the Plan.
- Section 8.3 No Work Disruption Over Jurisdiction: All jurisdictional disputes shall be resolved without the occurrence of any strike, work stoppage, or slow-down of any nature, and the Employer's assignment shall be adhered to until the dispute is resolved. Individuals violating this section shall be subject to immediate discharge.
- <u>Pre-Job Conferences:</u> As provided in Article 16, each Employer will conduct a pre-job conference with the Council prior to commencing work. The District will be advised in advance of all such conferences and may participate if it wishes. Pre-job conferences for

different Employers may be held together.

Section 8.5 Resolution of Jurisdictional Disputes: If any actual or threatened strike, sympathy strike, work stoppage, slow down, picketing, hand-billing or otherwise advising the public that a labor dispute exists, or interference with the progress of Project Work by reason of a jurisdictional dispute or disputes occurs, the Parties shall exhaust the expedited procedures set forth in the Plan, if such procedures are in the plan then currently in effect, or otherwise as in Article 7 above.

ARTICLE 9 MANAGEMENT RIGHTS

- Section 9.1 <u>Contractor and District Rights:</u> The Contractors and the District have the sole and exclusive right and authority to oversee and manage construction operations on Project Work, as set forth in this Article, without any limitations unless expressly limited by a specific provision of this Agreement or the applicable MLA. In addition to the following and other rights of the Contractors enumerated in this Agreement, the Contractors expressly reserve their management rights and all the rights conferred upon them by law. The Contractor's rights include, but are not limited to, the right to:
 - (a) Plan, direct and control operations of all work;
- (b) Hire, promote, transfer and layoff their own employees, respectively, as deemed appropriate to satisfy work and/or skill requirements;
- (c) Promulgate and require all employees to observe reasonable job rules and security and safety regulations;
 - (d) Discharge, suspend or discipline their own employees for just cause;
- (e) Utilize, in accordance with District approval, any work methods, procedures or techniques, and select, use and install any types or kinds of materials, apparatus or equipment, regardless of source of manufacture or construction; assign and schedule work at their discretion; and
- (f) Assign overtime, determine when it will be worked and the number and identity of employees engaged in such work, subject to such provisions in the applicable MLA (s) requiring such assignments be equalized or otherwise made in a nondiscriminatory manner.
- Section 9.2 <u>Specific District Rights:</u> This Agreement does not, in any way, restrict or otherwise infringe on the District's absolute right to administer the work of the Project, its construction program and its general bond funds in any way it determines. The District expressly reserves its management rights and all the rights conferred on it by law and its contract with the Contractor.

Section 9.3 Use of Materials: There should be no limitations or restriction by Union upon a Contractor's choice of materials or design, nor, regardless of source or location, upon the full use and utilization, of equipment, machinery, packaging, precast, prefabricated, prefinished, or preassembled materials, tools or other labor saving devices, subject to the application of the California Public Contract and Labor Codes as required by law in reference to offsite construction. Generally, the onsite installation or application of such items shall be performed by the craft having jurisdiction over such work. The District shall advise all Contractors of, and enforce as appropriate, the off-site application of the prevailing wage law as it affects Project Work.

Section 9.4 Special Equipment, Warranties and Guaranties:

- It is recognized that certain equipment of a highly technical and specialized nature (a) may be installed at Project Work sites. The nature of the equipment, together with the requirements for manufacturer's warranties, may dictate that it be prefabricated, pre-piped and/or pre-wired and that it be installed under the supervision and direction of the District's and/or manufacturer's personnel. The Unions agree to install such equipment without incident.
- The Parties recognize that the Contractor will initiate from time to time the use of new technology, equipment, machinery, tools, and other labor-savings devices and methods of performing Project Work. The Union agrees that they will not restrict the implementation of such devices or work methods. The Unions will accept and will not refuse to handle, install or work with any standardized and/or catalogue: parts, assemblies, accessories, prefabricated items, preassembled items, partially assembled items, or materials whatever their source of manufacture or construction.
- If any disagreement between the Contractor and the Unions concerning the methods of implementation or installation of any equipment, or device or item, or method of work, arises, or whether a particular part or pre-assembled item is a standardized or catalog part or item, the work will precede as directed by the Contractor and the Parties shall immediately consult over the matter. If the disagreement is not resolved, the affected Union(s) shall have the right to proceed through the procedures set forth in Article 10.
- In limited circumstances requiring special knowledge of the particular item(s), the (d) installation of specialty process equipment or systems may be performed by employees of a manufacturer, or by designated representatives of the manufacturer, if necessary to maintain the manufacturer's warranty or guarantee, provided, however, that the manufacturer can demonstrate by an enumeration of specific tasks that the work cannot be performed by craft workers covered by this Agreement

ARTICLE 10 SETTLEMENT OF GRIEVANCES AND DISPUTES

Section 10.1 Cooperation and Harmony on Site:

- This Agreement is intended to establish and foster continued close cooperation (a) between management and labor. The Council shall assign a representative to this Project for the purpose of assisting the Unions, and working with the District, together with the Contractors, to complete the construction of the Project economically, efficiency, continuously and without any interruption, delays or work stoppages.
- The District, the Contractors, Unions, and employees collectively and individually, realize the importance to all Parties of maintaining continuous and uninterrupted performance Project Work, and agree to resolve disputes in accordance with the grievance provisions set forth in this Article or, as appropriate, those of Article 7 or 8.
- The Council shall oversee the processing of grievances under this Article and (c) Articles 7 and 8, including the scheduling and arrangements of facilities for meetings, selection of the arbitrator from the agreed-upon panel to hear the case, and any other administrative matters necessary to facilitate the timely resolution of any dispute; provided, however, it is the responsibility of the principal parties to any pending grievance to insure the time limits and deadlines are met.
- Section 10.2 <u>Processing Grievances</u>: Any questions arising out of and during the term of this Agreement involving its interpretation and application, which includes applicable provisions of the MLA's, but not jurisdictional disputes or alleged violations of Section 7.1 and 7.5 and similar provisions, shall be considered a grievance and subject to resolution under the following procedures.
- Employee Grievances: When any employee subject to the provisions of this Agreement feels aggrieved by an alleged violation of this Agreement, the employee shall, through his Union business representative or, job steward, within ten (10) working days after the occurrence of the violation, give notice to the work site representative of the involved Contractor stating the provision(s) alleged to have been violated. A business representative of the Union or the job steward and the work site representative of the involved Contractor shall meet and endeavor to adjust the matter within ten (10) working days after timely notice has been given. If they fail to resolve the matter within the prescribed period, the grieving party may, within ten (10) working days thereafter, pursue Step 2 of this grievance procedure provided the grievance is reduced to writing, setting forth the relevant information, including a short description thereof, the date on which the alleged violation occurred, and the provision(s) of the Agreement alleged to have been violated. Grievances and disputes settled at Step 1 shall be non-precedential except as to the parties directly involved.

<u>Union or Contractor Grievances:</u> Should the Union(s) or any Contractor have a dispute with the other Party(ies) and, if after conferring within ten (10) working days after the disputing Party knew or should have known of the facts or occurrence giving rise to the dispute, a settlement is not reached within five (5) working days, the dispute shall be reduced to writing and processed to Step 2 in the same manner as outlined in 1(a) above for the adjustment of an employee complaint.

- Step 2. The business manager of the involved Union or his designee, together with the site representative of the involved Contractor, shall meet within seven (7) working days of the referral of the dispute to this second step to arrive at a satisfactory settlement thereof. If the Parties fail to reach an agreement, the dispute may be appealed in writing in accordance with the provisions of Step 3 within seven (7) calendar days after the initial meeting at Step 2.
- Step 3. (a) If the grievance shall have been submitted but not resolved under Step 2, either the Union or Contractor Party may request in writing to the other Party (ies)) within seven (7) calendar days after the initial Step 2 meeting, that the grievance be submitted to an arbitrator selected from the agreed upon list below, on a rotational basis in the order listed. Those arbitrators are: John Kagel, Thomas Angelo, Robert Hirsch, and Thomas Pagan. The decision of the arbitrator shall be final and binding on all Parties and the fee and expenses of such arbitrations shall be borne equally by the involved Contractor(s) and the involved Union(s).
- Failure of the grieving Party to adhere to the time limits established herein shall render the grievance null and void. The time limits established herein may be extended only by written consent of the Parties involved at the particular step where the extension is agreed upon. The arbitrator shall have the authority to make decisions only on issues presented and shall not have the authority to change, amend, add to or detract from any of the provisions of this Agreement.
- The fees and expenses incurred by the arbitrator, as well as those jointly utilized by the Parties (i.e., conference room, court reporter, etc.) in arbitration, shall be divided equally by the Parties to the arbitration, including Union(s) and Contractor(s) involved.
- Section 10.3 Limit on Use of Procedures: All Project disputes involving the application or interpretation of the Schedule A Agreement involving the parties signatory hereto shall be resolved pursuant to the resolution procedures of that Schedule A Agreement. All disputes relating to the interpretation or application of this Agreement, other than disputes under Article 7 (Work Stoppages and Lock-Outs) and Article 8 (Work Assignments and Jurisdictional Disputes), shall be subject to resolution by the grievance and arbitration procedures set forth in section 10.2 above.
- Section 10.4 Employee Discipline. All disputes involving the discipline and/or discharge of an employee working on the Project shall be resolved through the grievance and arbitration provisions contained in the Schedule A Agreement for the craft of the affected employee.
- Section 10.5 Notice: The District shall be notified by the Council and the involved Contractor(s) of all actions at Steps 1, 2 and 3, and further, the District shall, upon its own request, be permitted to, but has no obligation to, participate fully as a party or observer in all proceedings at any step, but in no event shall be obligated to pay any portion of any fee(s) or expense(s) related thereto.

ARTICLE 11 REGULATORY COMPLIANCE

- Section 11.1 Compliance with All Laws: The Council and all Unions, Contractors, subcontractors and their employed shall comply with all applicable federal and state laws, ordinances and regulations including, but not limited to, those relating to safety and health, employment and applications for employment. All employees shall comply with the safety regulations established by the District or the Contractor. Employees must promptly report any injuries or accidents to a supervisor.
- Section 11.2 <u>Monitoring Compliance</u>: The Parties agree that the Council shall monitor compliance by all Contractors and subcontractors with all federal and state laws regulation that relate to the provisions in this Agreement, from time to time that apply to Project Work. It shall be the responsibility of the Council to investigate or monitor compliance with these various laws and regulations. The Council may recommend to the District, procedures to encourage and enforce compliance with these laws and regulations.
- Section 11.3 Prevailing Wage Compliance: The Council, the Union and the Contractor agree to confer and, in good faith, work together to resolve all complaints regarding any potential prevailing wage violation. If those parties cannot reach a resolution, the complaint shall be resolved pursuant to Section 5.4. The Council or Union, as appropriate, shall be advised in a timely manner with regard to the facts and resolution, if any, of any complaint. It is understood that this Section does not restrict any individual rights as established under the State Labor Code, including the rights of an individual to file a complaint with the State Labor Commissioner or to file a grievance for such violation under the grievance procedure set forth in this Agreement.
- Section 11.4 Violations of Law: Based upon a finding of violation by the District of a federal and state law, and upon notice to the Contractor that it or its subcontractors are in such violation, the District, in the absence of the Contractor or subcontractor remedying such violation, may take such action as it is permitted by law or contract to encourage that Contractor to come into compliance, including, but not limited to, assessing fines and penalties, and/or removing the offending Contractor from Project Work. Additionally, in accordance with the Agreement between the District and the Contractor, the District may cause the Contractor to remove from Project Work any subcontractor who is in violation of state or federal law.

ARTICLE 12 SAFETY AND PROTECTION OF PERSON AND PROPERTY

Section 12.1 Safety:

- It shall be the responsibility of each Contractor to ensure safe working conditions and employee compliance with any safety rules contained herein or established by the District or the Contractor. It is understood that employees have an individual obligation to use diligent care to perform their work in a safe manner and to protect themselves and the property of the Contractor and the District.
- Employees shall be bound by the safety, security and visitor rules established by the Contractor and/or the District. These rules will be published and posted. An employee's failure to satisfy his/her obligations under this section will subject him/her to discipline, up to and including discharge.
- Section 12.2 <u>Suspension of Work for Safety:</u> A Contractor may suspend all or a portion of the job to protect the life and safety of employees. In such cases, employees will be compensated only for the actual time worked; provided, however, that where the Contractor requests employees to remain at the site and be available for work, the employees will be compensated for stand-by time at their basic hourly rate of pay.
- Section 12.3 Water and Sanitary Facilities: The Contractor shall provide adequate supplies of drinking water and sanitary facilities for all employees as required by state law or regulation.

ARTICLE 13 TRAVEL AND SUBSISTENCE

Travel expenses, travel time, subsistence allowances, zone rates and parking reimbursements shall be paid in accordance with the applicable MLA unless superseded by the applicable prevailing wage determination.

ARTICLE 14 APPRENTICES

Section 14.1 <u>Importance of Training:</u> The Parties recognize the need to maintain continuing support of the programs designed to develop adequate numbers of competent workers in the construction industry, the obligation to capitalize on the availability of the local work force in the area served by the District, and the opportunities to provide continuing work under the construction program. To these ends, the Parties will facilitate, encourage, and assist local residents to commence and progress in Labor/Management Apprenticeship and/or training Programs in the construction industry leading to participation in such apprenticeship programs. The District, other District consultants, and the Council, will work cooperatively to identify, or establish and maintain, effective programs and procedures for persons interested in entering the construction industry and which will help prepare them for the formal joint labor/management apprenticeship programs maintained by the signatory Unions.

Section 14.2 <u>Use of Apprentices:</u>

- Apprentices used on the Project under this Agreement shall be registered in Joint (a) Labor Management Apprenticeship Programs approved by the State of California. Apprentices may comprise up to thirty percent (30%) of each craft's work force at any time, unless the standards of the applicable joint apprenticeship committee confirmed by the Division of Apprenticeship Standards ("DAS"), establish a lower or higher maximum percentage, and where such is the case, the applicable Union should use its best efforts with the Joint Labor Management apprenticeship committee and, if necessary, the DAS to permit up to thirty percent (30%) apprentices on the Project.
- The Unions agree to cooperate with the Contractor in furnishing apprentices as requested up to the maximum percentage. The apprentice ratio for each craft shall be in compliance, at a minimum, with the applicable provisions of the Labor Code relating to utilization of apprentices. The District shall encourage such utilization, and, both as to apprentices and the overall supply of experienced workers, will work with the Council to assure appropriate and maximum utilization of apprentices and the continuing availability of both apprentices and journey persons.
- The Parties agree that apprentices will not be dispatched to Contractors working under this Agreement unless there is a journeymen working on the project where the apprentice is to be employed who is qualified to assist and oversee the apprentice's progress through the program in which he is participating.
- All apprentices shall work under the direct supervision of a journeyman from the (d) trade in which the apprentice is indentured. A journeyman shall be defined as set forth in the California Code of Regulations, Title 8 [apprenticeship], Section 205, which defines a journeyman as a person who has either completed an accredited apprenticeship in his or her craft, or has completed the equivalent of an apprenticeship in length and content of work experience and all other requirements in the craft which has workers classified as journeyman in the apprenticeship occupation. Should a question arise as to a journeyman's qualification under this subsection, the Contractor shall provide adequate proof evidencing the worker's qualification as a journeyman to the District and the Council.

ARTICLE 15 WORK OPPORTUNITIES PROGRAMS

Section 15.1 <u>Local Residents</u>. In addition to the provisions in Section 3.3 ("Referral Procedures") related to Local Residents, the Parties to this Agreement support the development of increased numbers of skilled construction workers from among Local Residents to meet the labor needs of the Project, specifically, and the requirements of the local construction industry generally. Towards that end, the Parties agree to cooperate respecting the establishment of a work opportunities program for Local Residents, the primary goals of which shall be to maximize construction work opportunities for traditionally underrepresented members of the community. In furtherance of the foregoing, the Unions specifically agree to:

- Encourage the referral and utilization, to the extent permitted by law and hiring a) hall practices, of qualified Local Residents as journeymen and apprentices on the Project, and entrance into such qualified apprenticeship and training programs as may be operated by signatory Unions; and
- Work cooperatively with the District and other District consultants to identify, or establish and maintain, effective programs, events and procedures for persons interested in entering the construction industry; and
 - c) Participate in District based job fairs, career days and outreach events; and
 - d) Provide speakers to speak at District programs and Academies as requested; and
- Assist Local Residents in contacting pre-apprenticeship programs that utilize the Building Trades multi-craft core curriculum (MC3) and the Apprenticeship Training Committees for the crafts and trades they are interested in. The Unions shall assist Local Residents who are seeking Union jobs on the Project and Union membership in assessing their work experience and giving them credit for provable past experience in their relevant craft or trade, including experience gained working for non-union Contractors. The Unions shall put on their rolls, qualified bona fide Local Residents for work on this Project; and
- Provide a contact information list for all Union representatives and Joint Apprenticeship Committee representatives; and
- Support local events and programs designed to recruit and develop adequate numbers of competent workers in the construction industry.
- Section 15.2 Apprenticeship Pathways for Current-Year High School Graduates. The Council and the Unions agree that District students who are new graduates of the District's preapprenticeship program or a Council-approved pre-apprenticeship program shall be treated as pre-apprentices and shall be given preferred and priority access and pathways to apprenticeship programs. Therefore, the Council and the Unions shall implement a targeted hiring program for the Project which requires Contractors working on the Project to employ new District preapprenticeship program graduates for at least fifteen percent (15%) of work hours on apprentice work on the Project per year, each year the agreement is in effect. The Council's and the Unions' ability to reach this goal is subject to District students' desire to enter into the trades, and District students' ability to satisfy the requirements for entry into the apprenticeship program.
 - The Parties agree that these pathways will be primarily provided through the MC3 (a) program offered through the State Center Community College District, but may also be satisfied at programs or campuses located in the area identified as the Third Tier in Attachment B.
 - (b) The Parties agree that:

- The District will provide the Council and the Unions opportunities to engage and discuss apprenticeship opportunities with current District students; and
- The Council and the Unions will provide at the end of each fiscal year and six (6) months thereafter, every year, detailed and confidential information on the students they have provided apprenticeship program access to, including which program(s) and the status of progress and/or graduation of each student currently in the program(s) or recently graduated from the program(s).
- The responsibilities of the Council and the Unions regarding the implementation of the targeted hiring program for District students shall be further addressed in a memorandum of understanding to be executed by the Council, the Unions and the District.

Section 15.3 Full-Time Pre-Apprentice/Internship/Apprenticeship Coordinator.

- The Council shall provide a coordinator, at the Council's expense whose responsibilities (a) shall include informing and advising District students and, when appropriate, District employees on the process, availability and opportunities of a career or job in the local construction trade industry. The coordinator shall visit each of the District's seven comprehensive high schools on an "as needed" basis but shall make a minimum of one visit per month to each of the seven high schools.
- The District will provide appropriate space at each site for the Coordinator to perform (b) his/her work. Subject to the District's process for field trips, off-campus curriculum or offering off-campus classes, the Council and the Unions will offer students tours of different apprenticeship programs.
- This access is intended to satisfy much of the District's obligation to provide (c) opportunities for the Council and the Unions to engage and discuss apprenticeship opportunities with current District students.
- Section 15.4 Council Scholarship for Disadvantaged Students. The Council shall fund and provide scholarship(s) to students to cover the costs of apprenticeship programs, for those students that are interested in pursuing a career or job in the local construction trade industry.

ARTICLE 16 WORKING CONDITIONS

Section 16.1 Meal and Rest Periods: There will be no non-working times established during working hours except as may be required by applicable state law or regulations. Meal periods and Rest periods shall be as provided for in Wage Order 16 (https://www.dir.ca.gov/iwc/StatementAsToTheBasisWageorder16.htm). Individual coffee containers will be permitted at the employees' work location; however, there will be no organized coffee breaks.

Section 16.2 Work Rules: The District and/or relevant Contractor shall establish such reasonable work rules as they deem appropriate and not inconsistent with this Agreement. These rules will be posted at the work sites by the Contractor and may be amended thereafter as necessary. Failure to observe these rules and regulations by employees may be grounds for discipline up to an including discharge.

Section 16.3 Emergency Use of Tools and Equipment: There should be no restrictions on the emergency use of any tools by any qualified employee or supervisor, or on the use of any tools or equipment for the performance of work within the jurisdiction, provided the employee can safely use the tools and/or equipment involved and is compliance with applicable governmental rules and regulations.

Section 16.4 Access Restrictions for Cars: Recognizing the nature of the work being conducted on the site, employee access by a private automobile may be limited to certain roads and/or parking areas.

ARTICLE 17 PRE-JOB CONFERENCES

Each Contractor will conduct a pre-job conference with the appropriate affected Union(s) prior to commencing work. The Council and the District shall be advised in advance of all such conferences and may participate if they wish. All work assignments shall be disclosed by the Contractor at a pre-job conference held in accordance with industry practice. Should there be any formal jurisdictional dispute raised under Article 8, the District shall be promptly notified.

ARTICLE 18 LABOR/MANAGEMENT COOPERATION

Section 18.1 Joint Committee: The Parties to this Agreement shall establish a six (6) person Joint Administrative Committee ("JAC"). This JAC shall be comprised of three (3) representatives selected by the District and three (3) representatives selected by the Council to monitor compliance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Each representative shall designate an alternate who shall serve in his or her absence for any purpose contemplated by this Agreement.

Section 18.2 <u>Functions of Joint JAC:</u> The JAC shall meet on a schedule to be determined by the JAC or at the call of the joint chairs, to discuss the administration of the Agreement, the progress of the Project, general labor management problems that may arise, and any other matters consistent with this Agreement. Substantive grievances or disputes arising under Articles 7, 8 or 10 shall not be reviewed or discussed by the JAC but shall be processed pursuant to the provisions of the appropriate Article. The Council shall be responsible for the scheduling of the meetings, the preparation of the agenda topics for the meetings, with input from the Unions, the Contractors and the District. Notice of the date, time and place of meetings, shall be

given to the JAC members at least three (3) days prior to the meeting. The Council shall prepare quarterly reports on apprentice utilization and the training and employment of District residents, and a schedule of Project Work and estimated number of craft workers needed. The JAC or an appropriate subcommittee, may review such reports and make any recommendations for improvement, if necessary, including increasing the availability of skilled trades, and the employment of local residents or other individuals who should be assisted with appropriate training to qualify for apprenticeship programs.

Section 18.3 Subcommittees: The JAC may form subcommittees to consider and advise the full JAC with regard to specific matters.

ARTICLE 19 SAVINGS AND SEPARABILITY

Section 19.1 Savings Clause: It is not the intention of the District, Contractor or the Union parties to violate any laws governing the subject matter of this Agreement. The Parties hereto agree that in the event any provision of this Agreement is finally held or determined to be illegal or void as being in contravention of any applicable law or regulation, the remainder of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect unless the part or parts so found to be void are wholly inseparable from the remaining portions of this Agreement. Further, the Parties agree that if and when any provision(s) of this Agreement is finally held or determined to be illegal or void by a court of competent jurisdiction, the Parties will promptly enter into negotiations concerning the substantive effect of such decision for the purposes of achieving conformity with the requirements of any applicable laws and the intent of the Parties hereto. If the legality of this Agreement is challenged and any form of injunctive relief is granted by any court, suspending temporarily or permanently the implementation of this Agreement, then the Parties agree that all Project Work that would otherwise be covered by this Agreement should be continued to be procured and constructed without application of this Agreement so that there is no delay or interference with the ongoing planning, procurement and construction of any Project Work.

Section 19.2 <u>Effect of Injunctions or Other Court Orders:</u> The Parties recognize the right of the District to withdraw, at its absolute discretion, the utilization of the Agreement as part of any procurement specification should a Court of competent jurisdiction issue any order, or any applicable statute which could result, temporarily or permanently in delay of the procurement, awarding and/or construction on the Project. Notwithstanding such an action by the District, or such court order or statutory provision, the Parties agree that the Agreement shall remain in full force and the fact on covered Project Work to the maximum extent legally possible.

ARTICLE 20 WAIVER

A waiver of or a failure to assert any provisions of this Agreement by any or all of the Parties hereto shall not constitute a waiver of such provision for the future. Any such waiver shall not constitute a modification of the Agreement or change in the terms and conditions of the Agreement and shall not relieve, excuse or release any of the Parties from any of their rights, duties or obligations hereunder.

ARTICLE 21 **AMENDMENTS**

The provisions of this Agreement can be renegotiated, supplemented, rescinded or otherwise altered only by mutual agreement in writing, hereafter signed by the negotiating Parties hereto.

ARTICLE 22 DURATION OF THE AGREEMENT

Section 22.1 <u>Duration</u>: This Agreement shall be effective from the date signed by all Parties, including all Unions listed in signature lines below, and shall remain in effect until completion of construction of all ProjectWork.

Section 22.2 Turnover and Final Acceptance of Completed Work:

- For purposes of this Agreement only, construction of any phase, portion, section, (a) or segment of Project Work shall be deemed complete when such phase, portion, section or segment has been turned over to the District by the Contractor and the District has accepted such phase, portion, section, or segment. As areas and systems of the Project are inspected and construction-tested and/or approved and accepted by the District or third parties with the approval of the District, the Agreement shall have no further force or effect on such items or areas, except when the Contractor is directed by the District to engage and repairs or modifications required by its contract(s) with the District.
- Final acceptance may be subject to a "punch" list, and in such case, the Agreement will continue to apply to each such item on the list until it is completed to the satisfaction of the District. At the request of the Union, completion information and information describing any "punch" list work, as well as any additional work required of a Contractor at the direction of the District pursuant to (a) above, involving otherwise turned-over and completed facilities which have been accepted by the District, will be available from the District.

ARTICLE 23 DRUG AND ALCOHOL TESTING

- 16.1 The use, sale, transfer, purchase and/or possession of a controlled substance, alcohol and/or firearms at any time during the workday is prohibited.
- Drug and alcohol testing shall be conducted in accordance with the substance abuse prevention policies set forth in the applicable Schedule "A". A list of the Schedule "A"s is attached hereto as Attachment D.

My office represents minor (FUSID#: minor; herein referred to as 'studentminor), a student at Ericson Elementary, within the Fresno Unified School District, and Felicia Fields, mother of the student, current Fresno residents at minor My client, student minor was injured as a result of acts or omissions of Fresno Unified School District (herein referred to as 'District'). Please accept this letter as it provides you formal legal notice of the student and family's claims for damages, pursuant to California Government Code Section 910, et seq. Per California Government Code 910.4, please provide any other supplemental form the District, may deem necessary to present this claim in compliance with Cal. Gov. Code 910, 910.2, et seq.

Date, Time. Circumstances Giving Rise to Claim:

On or about December 15, 2023, during the school day and immediately afterward, at approximately between hours of 8AM – 2:15PM and afterward, on the campus of Ericson Elementary, the school failed to adhere to a known asthma

health emergency medical plan. After numerous attempts by the student to receive medical attention and numerous indications student was having a health emergency (respiratory, sever asthma attack), the school failed to use the known health emergency action plan on file for the student. Ultimately, the school failed to adhere to its own 'Section 504' accommodation for student's known disability which resulted in severe injuries, requiring immediate medical attention.

Subsequently, the District has failed to address the incident, provide any investigation or accountability in regard to the incident. Furthermore, the school has yet to provide or schedule any 'Section 504 meeting', though numerous attempts were made by parents, and through counsel. The family has made numerous attempts to obtain Section 504 accommodations, evaluation and/or compliance a request for a modification of the 504 emergency action plan, in response to the incident, but all attempts have been unsuccessful. Thus, the District failed to provide a reasonable accommodation for the student's known disability and failed to provide a modification meeting or review of the requested accommodations.

General Description of Injury:

Due to the District's failure, the student suffered physical injury, property damage and extensive mental health trauma, the extent of such injuries and property damages not fully known at this time. However, the student's injuries as a result of the incident required emergency medical services attention and a prolonged stay in hospital intensive care. The extent of damage to the student's respiratory system and overall physical health are currently being evaluated. but fully unknown at this time. Ms. Lever, the student and Ms. Fields are currently attending regular medical visits and mental health therapy sessions to recover from these incidents/injuries and to assess any further injury they may have suffered due to the incident on 12/15/2024 or afterward. Notably, both the student, minor and minor mother, Ms. Fields are noticeably shaken by these occurrences and are suffering from a certain degree of 'post-traumatic stress' attributed to the incident. Ms. Fields complains of a noticeably different high stress and anxiety when required to merely carry out her daily and familial to school. Her stress arising out of fear of duties/routine of taking her minor what new incidents, dangers, harms may come to her minor in the custody of the District. Ms. Fields has also reported out of the ordinary high stress and in regarding to return to school. She attributes anxious reactions by her minor

their current mental health injuries to trauma suffered due to the incident on 12/15/2023. The full extent of such injuries is being evaluated, but not fully known, at this time.

Names of Agents, Employees Currently Unknown:

Under California Government Code 815.2, public entities are held vicariously liable for the negligent acts or omissions of their employees. It is our contention that District personnel at Ericson Elementary who had the responsibility of the custody of student, while at school, failed to meet their duty through acts or omissions to prevent harm to my clients, student and mother, Ms. Fields. Further, District personnel failed to exercise reasonable care to prevent harm to student. Thereby, The District is vicariously liable when its employees acting within the scope of employment, cause harm to a student. But for the District personnel's failure to meet their duty to maintain safety of the public, the student and family would not have been injured.

Damages Summary, At This Time:

As of the date of this claim, student minor damages include, but are not limited to:

Property Damage: Extensive medical expenses, hospital bills, expenses related to failure to provide accommodation, resulting injury, failure to modify 504 plan, failure to provide or schedule 504 accommodations meeting for student's known disability, failure to provide or schedule a Section 504 accommodations modification/reevaluation meeting, within a reasonable time, at parents request.

Physical Injury Suffered: Extensive damage to student's respiratory system, requiring emergency medical attention, hospital stay in intensive care. Claimant is attending regular visits to medical provider to assess extent of injuries suffered as a result of failure to follow emergency action plan; estimates of monetary amounts to be calculated, as they become known.

Mental Health Injury Suffered: As described, both the student minor and minor mother Ms. Fields are currently suffering from some 'post-traumatic stress' and severe anxiety attributed to the trauma of the incident and injuries suffered as a result of the incident that occurred on 12/15/2023. Both claimants are currently scheduled for regular visits to a mental health professional to assess

Specific names of all District personnel, administrators, medical staff or agents involved is currently unknown, other than those charged with the duty to care and custody of student while at school within the Fresno Unified School District, at Ericson Elementary. While much of this information is not included in current student/parent reports to counsel, the specific names of each agent or employee who may have caused the injury, should be uncovered via investigation by the District or during initial disclosure by the agency, records, recordings, communications, and/or court ordered discovery.

This Claim is based on the following facts: 15 16 At all relevant times, Claimant is and was an elementary school teacher employed by the District. She is and has been disabled in that she uses the assistance of a wheelchair for 17 ambulation. She is protected under the ADA because she has a substantial impairment that 18 19 significantly limits or restricts walking, which is a major life activity. On or about February 13, 2024, Claimant and her third grade class were scheduled 20 21 to take a field trip from Ayer Elementary to the Fresno Police Department Headquarters. Transportation for the field trip was scheduled through the District's Transportation Department. 22 23 The District, with 100 campuses, has just two buses that are specially designed and equipped to transport passengers who use wheelchairs. These specially equipped buses are 24 referred to by the District as "inclusion" buses. The District's remaining buses are not equipped to 25 transport passengers who use wheelchairs. Upon information and belief, the District employs just 26

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buses.

two bus drivers who are qualified to operate the equipment, e.g., mechanical lifts, of the inclusion

Months prior to the field trip, the Ayer Elementary school staff contacted the District's Transportation Department to schedule the transportation for the field trip and specifically requested an inclusion bus so that Claimant could attend the field trip with her students. The Friday before the field trip, school staff asked the District's Transportation Department to confirm the request for the inclusion bus and the District's Transportation Department replied in an email, "Yes! We have an inclusion bus secured for this experience."

When the District buses arrived on the day of the field trip to transport Claimant and her students to and from the Fresno Police Department, none of the buses was an inclusion bus. Unfortunately, this was not the first occasion on which the District's Transportation Department was requested to supply an inclusion bus, had confirmed the request, but failed to provide an inclusion bus, without warning or explanation no less, to Claimant so that she could attend a field trip with her students. Based upon those prior failures, Claimant elected to board the bus by pulling herself into the bus using her arms in a backward seated fashion. The incident was captured on video. She elected to not call the Transportation Department and insist on an inclusion bus because, based upon past experience, this request would have either not been fulfilled due to lack of resources, or would have unreasonably delayed the field trip for her students and their chaperones. She elected to not transport herself in her personal vehicle because this would have required her to use her manual wheelchair, rather than her electric wheelchair, during the field trip which is physically difficult for her.

The District's failure to provide an inclusion bus for Claimant to accompany her students on their field trip, as essential function of her job, was a failure to provide a reasonable accommodation to the known physical limitations of a qualified individual with a disability and was a violation of the ADA.

DESCRIPTION OF DAMAGES

Pursuant to subdivision (d) of Government Code section 910, the following constitutes a general description of damages Claimant incurred so far as it may be known at the time of presentation of this Claim: Pain and suffering, emotional distress and mental anguish, unjust hardship, inconvenience, and loss of enjoyment of life.

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Included in the Board binders is information regarding proposed vendors selected through the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) 22-30S4, Curriculum, Instruction, and Professional Learning Services. The Board approved the initial RFQ on March 22, 2023. Supplemental rounds were approved on August 08, 2023, and October 18, 2023, to ensure a pool of vendors in the categories of Curriculum, Professional Learning, and Indirect/Direct Student Services. The RFQ establishes a list of prequalified vendors that may be used for services and will support the implementation of Fresno Unified School District's Every Child is a Reader literacy initiative.

The goal of Fresno Unified School District's literacy initiative is to ensure all students can read by the end of their first-grade year. Progress monitoring metrics will include early literacy assessments, including Desired Results Developmental Profile, iReady, Foundational Skills Assessments for students in Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten, and other regionally identified assessments.

This supplemental round closed on February 02, 2024, and all vendor designations are consistent with the evaluation and selection process outlined in the RFQ. The term will begin upon board approval through June 30, 2024, with the option of up to four one-year renewal terms for a maximum end date of June 30, 2028.

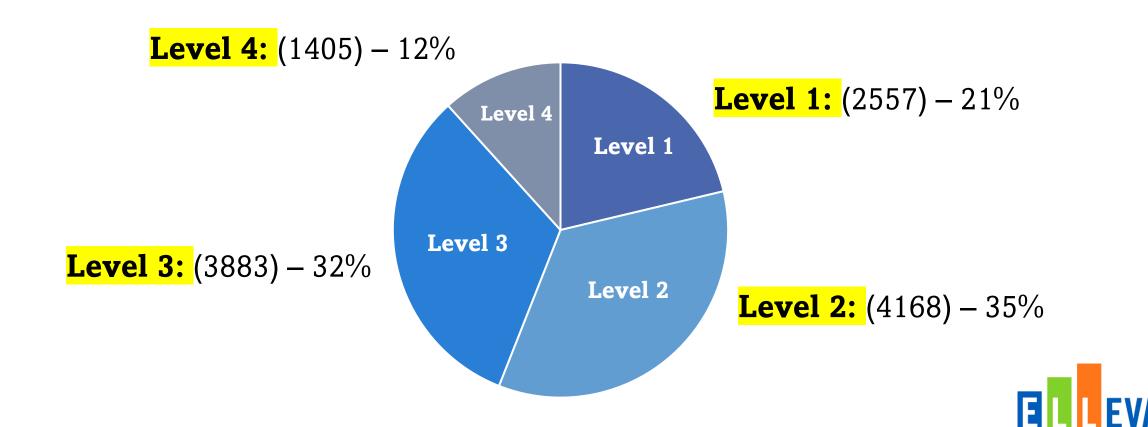

Summative English Language Proficiency Assessments for California (ELPAC) - 2023

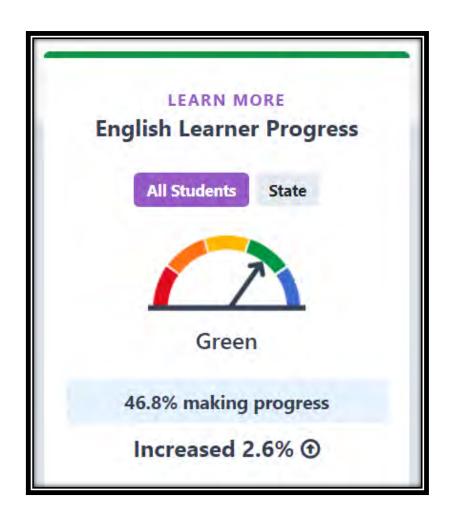


Spring 2023 Summative ELPAC Overall Performance Levels



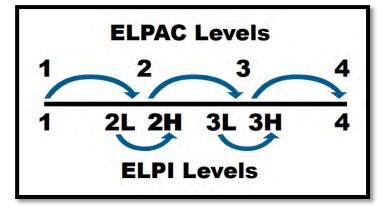

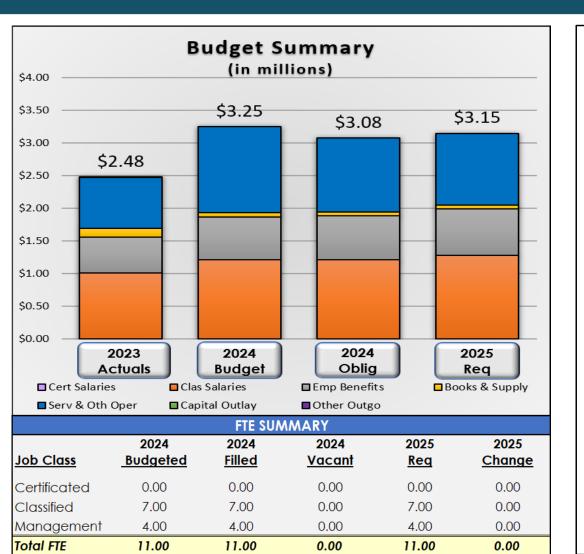


Financial Reporting Timelines
